7. Listen to Podcasts

On services like Spotify and Apple Podcasts, you can find foreign language podcasts. At beginner to intermediate levels, language-learning podcasts can help you get additional immersion easily. At advanced levels, you can take it a step further with material intended for natives.

8. Read

Improve your reading comprehension by reading in your language. Start easy with children's books or comics, and work upward to newspapers, nonfiction, or works of literature.
