In a free nation, politics will always be competitive. What keeps this competition healthy are the structural protections of our Constitution—particularly federalism.

The structure of American federalism was created to foster unity and self-government—a unity that joins the people and their states in a limited national government to address common problems while reserving local self-government over most aspects of our daily lives. Federalism reinvigorated, we believe, holds the promise of addressing our most bitter partisan disputes and provides the framework for innovative 21st century policy solutions.

The increasing centralization of governing power is unsustainable; national debt threatens grants and aid to state and local governments, competing presidential executive orders create societal "whiplash," and top-down mandates ignore local priorities and obscure accountability.

Could states hold the power to correct this course? The Supreme Court has expressed, "The independent power of the States also serves as a check on the power of the Federal Goverment." Our Constitution depends on states maintaining appropriate roles and responsibilities in this governing partnership. The safeguards of federalism were intended to enhance accountability, protect local diversity and innovation, and magnify the people's governing voice.

At this time of extreme political and public stress, we again face the fundamental questions of American politics: "How can liberty be preserved in a large republic?" "How do we reconcile unity with diversity?" And, "How can government remain accountable to the people?" Our future, and the future of our nation, depends in no small part on the answers to these questions.

This summit convenes a bipartisan coalition of state leaders in an effort to lower the political temperature in our nation by returning governing focus to structure over politics; a first step in reviving the structural safeguards of federalism that do reconcile diversity with unity over a vast, self-governing nation. We invite you to join in rebalancing the State-Federal partnership that is central to our liberty now, and for the next 250 years.




