



#### So What?


- ▶ Recognize the Lenses you see through have been developed through your life experiences, environments, and influences.

- Recognize your privileges and use them to open doors for those who don't have them.



The problem with stereotypes is not that they are untrue, but that they are incomplete. They make on story become the only story.





# Healthy Dissonance Learning Opportunities: Bridges of Exposure

- Education Formal and informal experiences that help us develop greater contextual understanding of people, places, and events that have shaped our current realities.
- **Engagement** Deliberate experiences with diverse individuals with the intent to learn from them.
- Immersion Deeper experience that takes one out of their comfort zones for a sustained time.

#### So What?

# **Humanizing Communication**

Goal – To facilitate greater understanding between two or more humans. The goal is not consensus but rather understanding. Remember — people want to be seen, heard, and understood.

- Active Empathy
- Genuine Inquiry
- Humanizing Words

#### **Active Empathy**

Active empathizers set aside time, resources, and energy to learn the challenges someone else might be facing. Empathy is developed the more we engage with people in meaningful conversations. Empathy is not a weakness. Rather, it is a courageous act of humanity.

Active empathy requires cultural humility — or the recognition that your awareness and understanding of the experiences and perspectives of others is limited. And, you genuinely believe you can learn from them.

## **Genuine Inquiry**

Asking sincere and open-ended questions with the intent to truly learn and understand. Genuine Inquiry stems from cultural humility and reveals our attitudes and dispositions towards learning.

An important component of Genuine Inquiry is a clarifying question—especially in the face of a charged or inciting comment. Clarifying questions can (1) elicit more context to improve understanding, and (2) de-escalate the initial tension of the comment. Note – the reactions to our questions and inquiries depend on the relationship, the tone, and the context.

#### **Humanizing Words**

Words matter! And words are tied to how people identify (personal pronouns, race/ethnicity/nationality, sexual orientation, gender identity & expression, and names). It can be difficult to keep up with personal preferences of how people want to be identified. But that shouldn't stop us from trying and learning.

Validation means that when someone says they experience the world in a certain way, we believe them. We humanize individuals by advocating for them when others may have diminished them or belittled them.

#### So What?

- ► Courageous empathizers set aside time, resources, and energy to learn the challenges someone else might be facing.
- Cultural Humility is our recognition of our limitations and a belief that we can actually learn from the experiences of others.
- Genuine Inquiry leads to increased context and understanding.
- Words Matter The power of naming one's own identities, experiences, and perspectives is important in building humanity.

#### So What?

- ▶ Building community is multidirectional (past, present, and future)
- ▶ Be deliberate about mentorship and sponsorship and seek to be a positive entry in the life book of your students.
- Focus on communityship and opportunities to have people lift together (spirit of bayanihan).
- Show up with solutions, not just critiques.
- ▶ Demonstrate your own creative appreciation for those who have come before. Through study of new histories, we can more fully appreciation the humanity it took for us to carry on our work.

#### So What?

I hope teachers will deliberately build into their lesson plans:

- Discussions on classroom agreements—"How will we talk about difficult topics this year?"
- Exercises that reveal worldviews as results of their lived experiences and it frames our moral codes or our sense of right and wrong
- An invitation to lean into healthy dissonance
- Assignments that provide exposure to, education about, engagement with, and immersion in new cultural contexts
- Modeling how we can engage in humanizing communication—especially when we disagree
