# Keynote Speaker **Dr. Astrid S. Tuminez**

Dr. Astrid S. Tuminez (pronounced too-MEE-nez) was appointed the seventh president of Utah Valley University in 2018, and is the institution's first female president. Tuminez brings to UVU a broad and rich experience in academia, philanthropy, technology, and business.

She was born in a farming village in the Philippine province of Iloilo. When she was two years old, Tuminez moved with her parents and six siblings to the slums of Iloilo City where her parents were seeking better educational opportunities for their children.

Tuminez was 5 years old when Catholic nuns offered her and her siblings a chance to go to school, which changed the trajectory of her life. As a 15-year-old, she went to college at the University of the Philippines, taking

what she calls a tour of majors.

She applied to and was accepted by BYU, where she discovered a knack for languages, double majoring in Russian literature and international relations. She counts BYU professor Gary Browning, who taught Russian, as a lifetime mentor.

Next came graduate school at Harvard University on scholarship followed by a doctorate at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology in political science.

Before assuming her current position, President Tuminez was a world leader in the fields of technology and political science, most recently serving as an executive at Microsoft, where she led corporate, external and

legal affairs in Southeast Asia. Tuminez is also the former vice dean of research and assistant dean of executive education at the Lee Kuan Yew School of Public Policy, National University of Singapore, the premier school of public policy in Asia.

A friend in Utah encouraged her to consider applying for the opening at UVU and "the more I looked, the more excited I felt. The mission really resonated with me, working with all sorts of students, traditional and nontraditional, and looking toward their success in life, student success in learning and in life, to tell students 'Come as you, whatever phase you're in in your education journey,' " she said.



Accepting the job meant moving 8,750 miles across the globe from Singapore with her husband, Jeffrey Tolk, and their sons, ages 16 and 8. Their daughter, 22, lives and works in North Carolina.

She is fluent in English, Filipino/Tagalog, Ilongo, Russian, and French with a working knowledge of Spanish. In her spare time, she enjoys running, dancing, and martial arts.

# Featured Storyteller Sam Payne

Sam Payne travels the world telling stories and singing songs about growing up the son of a folk singer and the grandson of a World War II veteran in the American West. He has brought his stories and songs to halls in Canada Bulgaria, Tokyo, and from coast to coast in the United states. Most of Sam's songs come from his own ideas but he says that some of the most interesting work he does has to do with making songs and stories from other people's ideas as a song-

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writer-for-hire.

For BYU Radio he hosts, "The Apple Seed: Tellers and Stories," a daily radio show on the art of storytelling. *The Apple Seed* features the world's best storytellers with tales that are funny, adventuresome, and thought-provoking, all hosted by Sam Payne.

One of his latest Broadcasts, titled Generations was aired March 11, 2019 at 7:00 pm. You'll hear Sam's muse about the passing of wisdom through various generations reflected in a story about a recent family reunion talent show. That story serves as a springboard for a tale by Kevin Kling called "Lake," a couple of songs from songwriter and storyteller John McCutcheon, recorded live at the Timpanogos Storytelling Festival, and a great story from Bill Harley about his own kids growing up.

**Esther Megargel** received a master's degree in composition from BYU in 2013. She has awards from



Mu Phi Epsilon, the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints, BYU (Vera Hinckley Mayhew Award), and a commission as Composer of the year by OMTA (Oregon Music Teachers Assn.) 

As a single mom, one of the constant worries I have is finances. I struggle to provide for my family and stay in school. There have been many times when I had to consider quitting school to work. Because of donors like you, I have been able to stay in school and continue my dream of getting an education and career. The relief that has come from financial assistance and donors like you, is indescribable. My long-term goal after graduating and finding a career where I feel fulfilled and satisfied,

My name is **Monica English**. I was born and raised in Utah County. I received my Associate of Arts from UVSC back in the 90's and have returned now to complete my bachelor's degree. I am in the Integrated Studies Program with my areas of emphasis being Peace and

Justice Studies and Religious Studies. I am also minoring in Gender Studies. I am a senior and will graduate in May of this year.

When I returned to college, I was in my 40's and had been out of an academic environment for 20 years. I have been a mostly stay at home mom for all of that time. We have an unusual family with some children born to us, a couple of children adopted from Zambia and a few more adopted from Foster Care. Because we have a large family (seven children still at home) there is always a need to balance my education against the needs of our family life. Finances are always the first consideration. This scholarship gives me the security to know that I am not sacrificing the needs of my family for my education. I have deep gratitude for Elder Quest and those who have made this possible. It truly makes a difference.

After I graduate, I plan on continuing on to grad school in conflict studies. I am fascinated in the way societies clash and the ways in which violence ceases. During my time here at UVU I prepared a grant to interview women in Northern Ireland who were involved in the peace negotiations in the 1990's. I received this grant and with it I spent two weeks in post conflict areas of Northern Ireland doing archival research and interviewing women who were instrumental at ensuring women's voices were heard and incorporated into the peace accords. I would like to continue this research as a master's thesis and continue on to receive a PhD.

When I returned to school after such a long break, I worried that I wouldn't be able to keep up with the students in their 20's. What I have found is that my life experiences, particularly working within the foster care system and adopting children who are a racial minority in this area has given me a very personal insight into the classroom discussions. I want to continue to bring this insight to my graduate studies and then I hope to be able to enter academia myself.

I am so grateful for this scholarship, it offers me the freedom to focus on education without feeling like I am burdening the very family that inspired me to return to school. I am honored and humbled to be chosen, I know there are many, many worthy students who could have been chosen in my

Ya'at'eeh, Shii' ei **Brianna John** yinishye'. Tl'aa'schi'i nishli', doo' T'o'aheedliinii ba'shishchiin. In the Navajo culture its appropriate to include our matrilineal clans when we introduce ourselves.



Hello! I am Brianna John and I am Diné (Navajo) I was born in Shiprock, NM located on the northern part of the Navajo Reservation. I moved to Utah to pursue an education in Social Work, I am a sophomore working on my pre-requisites before I apply for the BSW program this spring.

As a single mother of three children, I don't fit the traditional student profile, but my hard work has proven to me that I can reach my goals and I am capable. I was raised by a single mother and our family fits the statistics of a Native American family living in poverty. I am proud to be the first in my family to attend college and set an example for my children and younger siblings in my family. I understand that I am not in the best place financially to be in school however, I don't want my financial situation to get in the way of the dreams I am striving to achieve. I am so grateful for opportunities like the one your foundation is providing for students like myself, this scholarship has eased the financial strain of being a single mother in college and more importantly has provided

me more time to commit towards my studies, so I can reach my full potential as a college student.

There is a shortage of Social workers on the reservation, one of the main issues is the cultural divide, being a female native american this provides me with an advantage. I have lived on the Navajo reservation and I am now living here in the city, the cultural difference between the two is immense and I can relate to both urban living as well as the reality I see on my reservation and use this as a way to break through these barriers. Observing my family work on the reservation has helped me to understand the importance of being a social worker and the positive changes it can do for a community. I am a survivor of domestic violence, and I have been through many hardships throughout my life, I hope to use my story to help others who are in the same position I was once in and make constructive changes to the people in my community creating a better environment for my people.

I am honored to be the recipient of the Elder Quest scholarship. I would like to take this opportunity to sincerely thank you for your generous, financial support towards my higher education.

## Travel Directions for the Spring Seminar

Going west on 800 South in Orem, turn left at the first signal after 800 West. The street is not marked but you are on College Drive. Continue south until you see the parking garage. There is a sign that says parking for "Roots of Knowledge". Go to level 4,5 or 6. Then find the elevator and go to level 2 in the building.

Coming from the freeway on University Parkway exit, turn left into the main entrance to UVU. Do not go around the round-about. Turn right and follow the road (College Dr.). Follow the signs to the Sorensen Center. You will need to watch carefully after the LDS Institute Bldg. because the parking terrace faces north. Go to level 4,5 or 6. Then find the elevator and go to the level 2 in the building.

From the frontage road in Orem go to 800 South and turn east. Just before you get to 800 West there is an intersection with a light. Turn right onto College Drive. It is not marked. Follow the road south until you see the parking terrace. There is a sign that says parking for "Roots of Knowledge". Go to level 4,5 or 6. Then take the elevator to level 2 in the building.

There is an entrance to UVU across the street from Lakeridge Jr. High on 960 South. There is a sign on the west side of the road that says UVU. Turn west on 960 South and follow the signs to the Sorensen Center. You will need to watch carefully after the LDS Institute Bldg. because the parking terrace faces north. Go to level 4,5 or 6. Then find the elevator and go to level 2 in the building.

If you don't feel comfortable driving yourself, meet Cathy Carter at the park by the Orem Senior Center. Park in the public parking on the north side of the park and meet at 9 a.m. She will lead you to the Sorensen Center or will give you a ride.
