
Nearly two-thirds of students who discontinue their studies cite 'finances' as the driving reason behind their decision.

The state of Utah has one of the highest rates of college students per capita. Yet, the reality is that nearly 20 percent of individuals between the ages of 25 to 64 are designated as 'having some college, but no degree.'

Is completing college worth the investment for students who are financially struggling to finish a degree?

- Student earnings are \$100,000 higher than peers who ended education after high school (Source: Brookings)
- Unemployment is only 3.6 percent for those with bachelor's degrees, compared to 11.4 percent for those with a high school diploma
- More education corresponds to better employment opportunities, even in the current pandemic-driven job market
