Course Description

It covers personal financial management with emphasis on decision making, budgeting, financial institutions, personal and family risk management, credit management, and estate planning. Assignment and Assessment Descriptions

Assignments

One of your first assignments is to complete the syllabus quiz. It is important that you familiarize yourself with the syllabus (this document) and all of the information in the Course Orientation module. This quiz is multiple/choice, true/false and must be taken as many times as necessary to receive perfect score. This will ensure that course expectations are clear.

Other assignments consist of acclimating to the course and getting to know other class members.

Adaptive Readings

Adaptive/"Smartbook" readings are given directly through the textbook publisher and correspond with your text chapter readings and are located online. The percentage of your grade will be based solely on completion of the reading (not on percent of correct answers to the questions). You will have unlimited access to repeat/practice each activity.

Discussions

Discussions will be opportunities to explore personal financial planning topics together. Posts to the discussion should add significantly to the conversation and support your point of view. *Comments that do not add significantly to a discussion will receive no credit*. It is okay to disagree in a discussion. In fact much learning happens when we disagree. However we need to be respectful and keep our online classroom a safe place to learn.

Discussions are due on **Thursdays (due date)**. Follow up comments are due by Sunday. Follow up posts are expected to be after the due date and are NOT marked late. Discussions conclude by the **Sunday (until date)**. After this, you will be unable to post.

• Personal Financial Planning (PFP) Project

The PFP project is a series of assignments that build on one another and help you understand the various practices, tools, and strategies that go along with financial management. The assignments are due shortly after related topics are covered in the course. See the "PFP Project Guide" for full details.

PFP Journal

Each week you will reflect on your learning in a PFP Journal. Serious effort on these assignments will help you complete your final project reflection (outlined in the "PFP Project Guide").

Assessments (Quizzes & Exams)

Each module has a chapter quiz consisting of true-false and multiple choice questions. You will three opportunities to take each quiz and your highest score will be recorded. Quiz questions a

randomly delivered from a larger pool of questions so every student will get a unique quiz. Quizzes are timed so you will need to come prepared. You may have time to look up some but not all answers.

Major exams cover particular chapters as indicated and again are true-false and multiple choice style questions from the module quizzes. In addition to the Exams, there is one Time Value Money (TVM) Exam that consists of problem questions asking you to calculate TVM and define certain terms.
