

DCPR 1800(302): Introduction to Non-Fiction Film Production

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Course Description

This course introduces professional video production techniques for non-fiction digital cinema projects, covering production processes such as working with subjects, crafting stories, filming techniques, lighting, production management, and basic post-production. Students will produce a short non-fiction (documentary) project through the complete pre-production, production, and post-production process.

Course Outcome: By semester's end, you should be able to independently create a short non-fiction film.

Skills & Competencies:

- Plan and organize a non-fiction film production
 - Develop a cinematic, engaging story for an audience
 - Write quality interview questions
 - Set up and shoot professional-looking interviews with camera, sound, and lighting
 - Capture quality audio using lavalier and shotgun microphones
 - Shoot and edit effective B-roll to support your story
 - Deliver a short documentary or corporate video in the correct format using basic non-linear editing software
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Class Policies

- **Communication:** Use Canvas Inbox for emails or Teams for messages. I check both frequently.
- **Attendance & Participation:** Active participation is essential. This is a hands-on course, so presence, collaboration, and preparation are expected. Occasional absences for illness or emergencies are understandable; communicate with me and review missed content promptly.
- **Canvas & Announcements:** Check regularly. The schedule may shift.

- **Assignment Submission:** Submit work via Canvas unless otherwise noted. Most video assignments will be shared as unlisted YouTube links.

 - **Equipment Practice:** If you have less prior experience, spend extra practice time with your gear.
 - **Required Purchases:**
 - A few films via Amazon/iTunes or Sundance tickets
 - External hard drive (≥1 TB, USB 3.0 minimum, formatted for Mac compatibility)
 - **Professionalism:** Network with peers, attend Cineskype and Film Club events, and maintain a respectful, inclusive classroom environment.
 - **Camera Use in Class:** During online sessions, keep your camera on to foster engagement.
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Course Structure

The semester centers on a **semester-long film project**, with smaller assignments building toward it.

Module 1: Interview & B-Roll Montage

- Conduct a 20+ minute interview and transcribe it for a “paper edit”
- Create a 3–5 minute edited interview with a clear story arc and supporting visuals
- Shoot and edit a 10–12 shot observational B-roll sequence

Module 2: How-To Video

- Produce a short instructional video demonstrating a process or skill, using composition, exposure, angles, and editing to tell the story visually

Module 3: Final Documentary Project

- Pitch proposal (Treatment)
 - Produce and edit a short documentary (≤6 minutes)
 - Submit final cut and a PDF production book (proposal, schedule, releases, etc.)

- You will need:
 - External hard drive (≥1 TB, USB 3.0 minimum, Mac-compatible)
 - A few streaming rentals/purchases or Sundance tickets
- Test all gear before leaving equipment checkout. You are responsible for lost/damaged items.

Equipment

- You may use your own DSLR/mirrorless camera or check out gear from **DGM Equipment Checkout**, Fulton Library, or the DGM Audio Studio.
- Department computers and labs have **Adobe Premiere Pro**, **DaVinci Resolve**, and **Microsoft 365**.
- You also have free access to **Adobe Creative Cloud** and **LinkedIn Learning** tutorials—use them.

- Create inclusive, accurate, and sensitive portrayals in your projects.
- Maintain confidentiality when classmates or guests share personal information.
- Collaboration is a professional skill—network, communicate clearly, and meet commitments.

 - 1st offense = F for the assignment (no redo)
 - 2nd offense = F for the course + report to Chair/Advising
- AI tools are not a substitute for your creativity.

- In Hollywood, many crews still mask on set—think of this as part of professional practice.
