"Circumstantial evidence must be inferred in order to come to a conclusion about a fact (Donley,
2018, p. 86). While this kind of evidence may be helpful in filling in the details about a case,
making a verdict more appropriate to the situation, there is a limit to how far one can infer the

facts. In this case, one can infer that Peterson used the tarp to transport his wife's body, and instead of going fishing, he went to dispose of it. Anything other than these inferences, however, would be beyond the abilities of these circumstantial evidences. Stating that Peterson killed his wife and disposed of the body in order to be with his mistress, would be a well composed statement of events, but there just isn't enough evidence to prove – beyond a reasonable doubt – all the elements of these events. While the Constitution doesn't explicitly state that a conviction must be made "beyond a reasonable doubt," this general rule has been upheld by the law since the creation of the Constitution in order to uphold the rights of Americans, and has been adopted by the United Nation's Universal Declaration of Human Rights ("Universal Declaration of Human Rights," n.d.)."
