Research Question:

Does a UVU student's major correlate with their perceptions on crime?

Desensitisation: Attreatment or process that diminishes emotional responsiveness to a negative, aversive or positive stimulus after repeated exposure to it. Desensitization also occurs when an emotional response is repeatedly evoked in situations in which the action tendency that is associated with the emotion proves irrelevant or unnecessary.


Research Formation

- 74 Completed Responses
- 94% Completion Rate
- Lasted 8 Days

Increasing Response Rate:

• In order to increase response rate, reminder emails were sent out to our sample of students to remind them to take the survey. This was done twice, in three day intervals. (N16,N19)






Top Majors


While approximately 15% of our desired amount responded to our survey, the top 3 majors that did participate include:

Primary Hypothesis Conclusion:


- 1. Our hypothesis was essentially incorrect, UVU students' majors DO NOT correlate with their perception of crime.
- Overall, responses were not uniform and no patterns were drawn between student majors and perceptions
- 3. It was found that UVU students perception on crime could not be identified based solely on their major.
- 4. It was found that each individual's viewpoint did not seem to be swayed or be able to be grouped together into classifications of major as each response held very little to no resemblance to their fellow students in the same major.



Level of Crime Concern








Level of Crime Concern by Gender






Conclusion

Research Conclusions

- Our Primary Hypothesis was proven incorrect. UVU student's perceptions on crime do not correlate to their majors.
- Our data did, however, show that UVU student's believe that Utah is a rather safe state with a majority percentage believing Utah's crime percentages were that of a slight threat or not a threat at all.
- Also shown was the fact that UVU students believe their neighborhoods to be extremely safe, more than that of Utah overall.





How Could We Improve?

- In order to maximise response rate, we should have sent out more reminder emails as well as increasing the amount of time the survey was available to our sample size.
- In order to get more data to get a better representation of UVU students perceptions on crime and the potential correlation with their majors, we should have sent out multiple separate surveys with a single survey being sent to a single major. A sample size of 500 students in each selected major would also give us fa better results, allowing us to better visualise potential connections.
