#### What is Autism?

According to the CDC, Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD), or more commonly referred to as autism, "is a developmental disability that can cause significant social, communication and behavioral challenges. There is often nothing about how people with ASD look that sets them apart from other people, but people with ASD may communicate, interact, behave, and learn in ways that are different from most other people. The learning, thinking, and problem-solving abilities of people with ASD can range from gifted to severely challenged. Some people with ASD need a lot of help in their daily lives; others need less."



Signs and Symptoms

- Avoid eye contact
- Want to be alone
- Not understand how to take, play, or relate to others
- Repeat certain actions continuously
- Either have an interest in other people or no interest at all
- Have trouble expressing their feelings or understanding others' feelings
- Have trouble explaining their needs

Autism is not as easily determined because we cannot see their disability like those with Down Syndrome.

- An Unanticipated Result


Q: How many years have you been working for your *current* department?





#### Autism awareness training for Riverton

According to a press release for The City of Riverton Police, that stated police training on autism has been limited, therefore "Given this limitation, the new in-depth training has provided an enhanced framework and specific strategies that can be employed when officers interact with individuals with autism."

In October and November of 2020, all 35 of Riverton's sworn police officers have now completed a in depth training on ways to interact with individuals who are in the autism spectrum.


#### Purpose

- How to understand and react with behaviors



#### Outside of POST, how regularly is this training received/reinforced?





#### What would you find most helpful?







### Do you feel like this topic needs to be addressed in law enforcement?

In a report on law enforcement's training with ASD, Gardner et al., (2018) said their "[r]esults indicated that most officers received between 400 and 770 h of total training at the basic recruit levels, of which only 3-12 h were focused on mental health disorders." They also acknowledge that ASD is not a mental disorder and justifies specified training (Gardner et al., 2018).

Based on the responses from our survey and the report that was done, law enforcement does need to make some changes to their trainings with ASD. There needs to be more focus on recognizing those with autism so they can be handled in a better way.



#### Conclusion

Those who have ASD are more frequently resistant to change and like to stick to their routine, they have a strong dislike of new situations.

When there is an interaction with someone in law enforcement, this creates a new situation for them outside of their regular routine and can increase their stress significantly and/or cause a "mental shutdown".

As officers receive training on how to best handle situations involving those with autism, they can feel more adequate and prepared for any situation they may encounter.
