
Winterhouse


This is a great book to use to teach context clues. There are several Spanish words that students can work to determine the meaning of.


This story would work well for Women's History Month to teach compare and contrast!

these two individuals have in common.





Dave the Potter


Artist, Poet, Slave









This book is a biography with incredibly detailed illustrations. Anything about Rube Goldberg is fantastic for STEM type challenges.

More fantastic books for a STEM activity that involves building with whatever random object the kids can find! Creativity abounds with these main characters.




Use alongside a STEM unit on building robots to teach the difference between facts and opinions.

Sound Shh...Bang...Pop...Boom!






Flying Lessons & Other Stories




Hip, Hip, Hooray!
