THE PROGRAM

The Emergency Services Department, in conjunction with the Institute of Emergency Services and Homeland Security, and the Utah Fire and Rescue Academy (UFRA) at Utah Valley University, prepares practicing and future emergency service professionals for the challenges of today and tomorrow through a program that balances technical skills, critical and ethical thinking, leadership, and communication skills.

Degree programs and individual courses are designed to meet both state and national professional requirements, including those established by the:

- Utah Fire Services Certification Council
- Utah Labor Commission, the United States Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA)
- National Fire Protection Association (NFPA)
- United States Department of Homeland Security (DHS)

The department's programs address multiple emergency service educational needs from professional certifications to degrees. APPLY FOR UVU ADMISSIONS

Complete the online application at www.uvu.edu/admissions and pay the application fee. The admissions deadline for fall semester is August 15 and for spring is December 20. A late fee may be charged for applications received after these deadlines.

After 48 hours, access your UVU student account and e-mail by going to www.uvu.edu and logging into UVLink with your UVID and default password/birthday (MMDDYY). If you have not yet obtained your UVID, click on the link titled, “How do I find my UVID?” This e-mail account is where ALL OFFICIAL UVU communications will be sent; be sure to check it often. A welcome packet will also be sent in the mail within one week.

COMPLETE WEBSTART PRE-ADVISEMENT

- a. Go to www.uvu.edu and click on UVLink.
- b. Click “Webstart” and begin the pre-advisement session.

SUBMIT ACT OR SAT SCORES AND HIGH SCHOOL / COLLEGE TRANSCRIPTS

Test scores are required for all students under age 21 who have not completed 15 or more college credits. They must be submitted by the admissions deadlines. All students can attend UVU regardless of test scores. The New Student Assessment test is required if:

- a. ACT scores in English, reading and/or math are less than 19 or SAT scores are less than 500 in verbal and/or math. (English scores must be less than 3 years old and math must be less than two years old.) Send scores to Testing Services, 800 W. University Parkway MS 120, Orem, UT 84058.
- b. College credit equivalent (AP, CLEP, transfer) to UVU’s ENGL 1010 and/or MAT 1010 or higher is not posted to your UVU transcript. Send official transcripts to: UVU, 800 W. University Parkway MS 106, Orem, UT 84058.

The UVU Placement Test is available at no charge at Testing Services in the Wolverine Service Center (WS 101). There is no appointment necessary. The WS is open M, W & TH 8 am-6 pm, T 8 am-8 pm, F 8 am-5 pm. The complete assessment takes approximately two hours. The last test is handed out two hours prior to closing. For questions regarding the Placement Test, call (801) 863-8269.

Do I need to be admitted to UVU to participate in this course?

Yes; apply for admissions at <http://www.uvu.edu/admissions/> and select the “New Student” or “Returning Student” tab to begin the application.

What is the Recruit Candidate Academy (RCA)?

A basic firefighter academy that includes two accredited college courses (16 credits) taken in one semester. It is a regimented, paramilitary course with a demand for respect and attention to detail. This includes uniform, appearance and attitude. It is also a very physically demanding course. Physical training (PT) may include running up to 5 miles a day. Training also includes rigorous exercise and weight lifting to build strength and endurance to prepare for the demands of a firefighter. The RCA course also has classroom time with written tests and a research paper.

What certifications will I receive if I successfully complete the RCA?

Upon successful completion, you will receive the following levels of certification from the State of Utah

- Firefighter I
- Firefighter II
- Hazardous Materials Awareness
- Hazardous Materials Operations

What are the prerequisites to get into the RCA for Fall 2012*?

- Successfully complete the Candidate Physical Ability Test (CPAT) within 9 months before RCA start date
- Have a valid driver’s license
- Minimum of EMT-Basic Certification (ESEC 1140 – EMT-B: 9 credits)
- Complete:
 - ENGH 0990 or higher or equivalent Accuplacer, ACT or SAT Mathematics score.
 - MAT 0990 or higher or equivalent Accuplacer, ACT or SAT English score.
 - ESFF 1000 – Intro to Emergency Services and Ability Testing (4 credits)
 - ESFF 1120 – Principles of Fire and Emergency Services Safety Survival (3 credits)
- Completion of the following will give **preference points**:
 - ESFO 1100 – Fire Behavior and Combustion (3 credits)
 - ESFO 1110 – Fire Prevention (3 credits)
 - ESFO 2050 – Fire Protection and Detection Systems (3 credits)
 - ESFO 2080 – Building Construction for the Fire Services (3 credits)
 - ESWF 1400 – Wildland Firefighting Fundamentals (4 credits)
 - ESEC 1160 – Emergency Medical Technician – Intermediate (6 credits) Any approved Humanities distribution course (COMM 1020 recommended)
 - Any approved Behavioral Science, Social or Political Science distribution course (PSY 1010 or SOC 1010 recommended)
 - Any approved Biology or Physical Science distribution course
 - Any approved Physical Education, Health, Safety or Environment course (PES 1097 recommended)

How do I get an RCA application?

Entry into this program is done through a competitive application process

When are RCA applications due?

- If you are applying for the Fall (August) semester, they are due by April 1st of the Spring semester
- If you are applying for the Spring (January) semester, they are due by October 1st of the Fall semester

Once I've been admitted to the RCA, when do classes start?

The RCA is one semester. Courses are offered during the following semesters:

1. Fall is August to December
2. Spring is January to April

How do I register?

Once prerequisites are verified and you've been notified of your acceptance into the program, an Emergency Services advisor will register you for the RCA classes.

What is the schedule for the RCA?

- RCA Night: Monday, Wednesday, Friday 5:00 pm – 10:00 pm and Saturday 8:00 am – 5:00 pm. These times are subject to change.

How is the semester schedule broken down?

Students will be enrolled in two classes totaling 16 credits

ESFF 250A (8 credits)

ESFF 205B (8 credits)

What is the cost of the RCA?

- Resident / Non-Resident Tuition and Fees: You will be charged \$1,650.00 for Module I (ESFF 250A) and \$1,650.00 for Module II (ESFF 250B), totaling at \$3,300.00 for the semester
- Books, Equipment, and Supplies: Approximately \$450

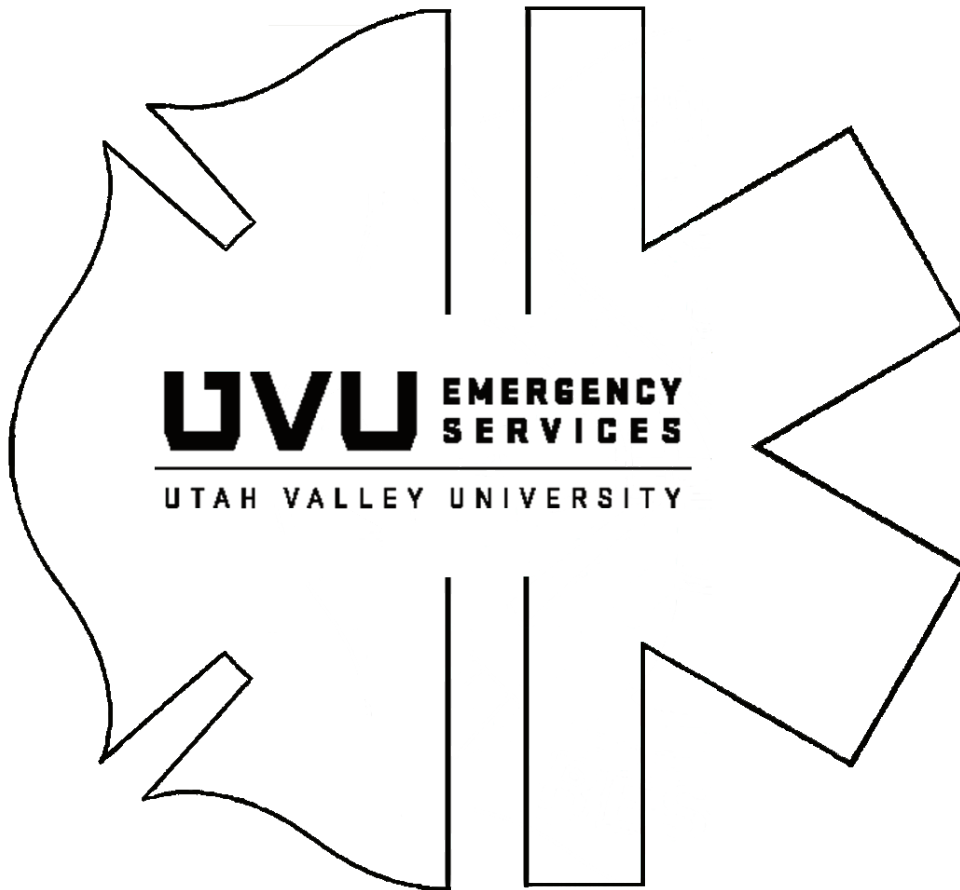

- Applicants **must** be admitted to Utah Valley University by the time the application is received.

Applicants must submit a statement of background and goals, typed or legibly written. Areas to be covered include: 1) Why are you considering the paramedic classes? 2) What are the logical steps in your education and career? 3) Where do you want to practice as a paramedic after training is completed? Do not include a resume or curriculum vitae as a substitute or addendum to this statement or any portion of the application materials.

- Obtain Accuplacer Sentence Skills/Reading Comprehension scores of 85+/65+, or ACT English/ACT Reading scores of 18+/18+, English/ACT Composite scores of 19+/19+, or SAT English score of 500+ or completion of ENGH 0990 or higher. *ACT or SAT reports may not be older than 10 years.*
- Obtain Accuplacer Arithmetic score \geq 100 or Elementary Algebra score of 44-58 or ACT mathematics score of 19+, or SAT mathematics score of 450+ or completion of MAT 0990 or higher, or completion of ESFF 1350. *ACT or SAT reports may not be older than 10 years.*
- You must be certified as an EMT-Basic for a minimum of four months and have current CPR certification. Your EMT certification cannot expire while in the program. *Please note that you must have your Utah EMT-B by the time paramedic courses begin.*
- Pass a paramedic course entry written examination, physical agility test, and interview.

After your application is turned in, applicants will be contacted by mail with their scheduled oral interview and physical agility test date and time. The written entry examination will be available for approximately one week. The dates will be included in the information. The paramedic course entry examination is a written evaluation of the applicant’s medical knowledge, EMT skills, problem solving ability, basic math calculations, medical terminology, anatomy, and physiology, and priority based problem solving. You may use a calculator for this test. The maximum allotted time to complete this test is four hours. The test results will be added to the oral interview and physical agility testing scores for an overall score and ranking entry.

Once accepted into the paramedic program, you must provide documentation of the following:

- Be at least 18 years old and have a valid driver’s license.
- Be able to comply with criminal background check requirements of UCA 26-8a-310 for certification as a paramedic in the state of Utah. **Applicants cannot have any felony convictions or be on probation.**
- Have current vaccinations, including Hepatitis B, MMR and TDap. Have current (within one year) TB test results.
