Federal Department of Foreign
Affairs (FDFA),
Berne. During

that time he served also as the Ambassador of Switzerland to the Principality of Liechtenstein, the Head of the Swiss Delegation to the Central Commission for Navigation on the Rhine (CCNR) (2003—2009), as President of the CCNR (2006—2007).

He attended Primary and Grammar schools in Basel. Received his Law Degree at the University of Basel, LL.D. Serves as lecturer at the Law Faculty of the University of Basel and is a member of various national and international legal associations.

His mother tongue is German and speaks English, French and

Spanish. He was born on 26 December 1958 in Basel. He is married to Colette Seger-Schneiter and has two sons.

THE FLAG OF SWITZERLAND



HISTORY

It is 1 of only 2 square sovereign-state flags. The dimensions of the white cross were only established in 1889, though the white cross had been used since the 14th century. The design to suspend the cross in a square red field came about during the Napoleonic period.

MEANING

The meaning of the flag is not clearly defined, but can be said that the cross was originally used as a military symbol. It is also legend that the color white was chosen because the apposing military forces carried a red cross.

- All major bridges leading to and from Manhattan were designed by Swiss engineers.
- Swiss are the world's largest consumers of chocolate: on average each Swiss consumes 22 lbs of chocolate per year.
