UNESCO Presentation

On March 28, the Office for Global Engagement hosted the Symposium for Academic Freedom. This included a presentation from UNESCO's senior liaison officer, Lily Gray. She started off by addressing the question—what does the right to education really mean? UNESCO is making a recommendation that will work to empower learners with knowledge, skills, values, and attitudes that will build towards more peaceful and sustainable societies. She then discussed open science and how it can bridge the science, technology, and innovation gap

between countries. UNESCO has just adopted a new international standard setting instrument on open science, which puts forth key pillars for open science: open scientific knowledge, open science infrastructure, open engagement of sociative actors, and the open dialogue with other knowledge systems. This recommendation recognizes the richness of diverse knowledge systems, emphasizing the fact that academic freedom is fundamental for the pursuit of knowledge, creativity, and sociative progress.



Also on March 28, the South African Zulu queen, Her Majesty Queen Nompumelelo, and her aunt, Ms. Thembelihle Ngcobo, had the opportunity to briefly visit UVU. They were given a brief tour of the Roots of Knowledge gallery by one of the curators, and they were given a couple gifts from the Office for Global Engagement.

Academic Freedom Symposium Summary



Uzeyir (Uzi) Ogurlu, Ph.D. Assistant Professor School of Education Utah Valley University

Dr. Uzi Ugurlu is a professor here at UVU, originally from Turkey. He delved into the history of academic freedom in Turkey, describing how many schools and universities were closed in the wake of recent political events, sending thousands of university presidents, professors, and students to jail. Dr. Ugurlu himself had his house raided in the early morning, though he was, at the time, an international scholar in the US. Simply because he is a professor, he has not been able to return to his country in many years. Dr. Ugurlu has had per-

sonal experience with the lack of academic freedom, and therefore emphasizes the sheer importance of having it and that we need to protect it.

Dr. Amna Afreen is from Pakistan and discussed how political events prevented her safety in her home country. Consequently, following these political changes, education and curriculum changed drastically. A high percentage of Pakistani children are not in school. Education that is taking place suffers from exclusivity and the belief in the inferiority of women. Several scholars have been assassinated, and others are having their findings silenced. Her experiences have also led her to strongly believe in the importance of academic freedom and why we must protect it.

Dr. Gülnar Eziz Preceptor Arts and Sciences Harvard University

Dr. Gülnar Eziz is from China, but is not Chinese. She is Uyghur—a part of a Turkic ethnic group living in the northwest part of China, called Xinjiang, and a group that is facing genocide today. While they, on paper, have their own autonomous region, this does not mean anything for the freedoms they have in practice. Unfortunately, for this people, the right to seek knowledge is being stunted. Scholars and intellectuals are being targeted in order to stifle progress. Over 500 scholars and researchers are being subjected to reeducation camps and

jail. Their textbooks are burned and the teaching of their language, the Uyghur language, is banned. Those who can must support academic freedom to prevent the erasing of languages and cultures of those who are prohibited to speak up.

Dr. Blair Bateman is a professor at the University of Utah. He spoke on his experiences as a gay professor at Brigham Young University, with conflict and discomfort that came with that, as well as experiences at the University of Utah with the new Utah law prohibiting diversity, equity, and inclusion centers at Utah schools. He brought up that in order for academic freedom to exist, faculty and students need to feel safe in being who they are and expressing who they are and expressing their beliefs, regardless of their country, their political ideology, and their religion.

75th Anniversary of the Declaration of Human Rights

This year marks the 75th Anniversary of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights. This document was written by representatives from all over the world and was adopted by the UN General Assembly in Paris on December 10th, 1948. To honor the 75th year of this first document of fundamental human rights, we are highlighting a few articles each month.

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You have the right to social security and are entitled to economic, social, and cultural help from your government. Everyone, as a member of society, has the right to social security and is entitled to realization, through national effort and international co-operation and in accordance with the organization and resources of each State, of the economic, social and cultural rights indispensable for his dignity and the free development of his personality.

Everyone has the right to work, to free choice of employment, to just and favourable conditions of work and to protection against unemployment. 23

Every adult has the right to a job, a fair wage, and membership in a trade union.



You have the right to leisure and rest from work. Everyone has the right to rest and leisure, including reasonable limitation of working hours and periodic holidays with pay.
