On October 12, the Office for Global Engagement hosted Mr. Juan Pascua, executive director of the Utah Hispanic Chamber of Commerce, to speak to UVU students. He discussed the makeup and influence of the chamber, with over 20,000 Hispanic businesses, and the three types of businessperson: employee, self-employee, and business

owner. Mr. Pascua challenged the students to choose what they want to be in the future, and then addressed the attitudes they'd need to have to achieve that goal. The students—business students with an understanding of the Hispanic world—benefited from Mr. Pascua's presentation.

This month's really really free market was another success! The next one is on November 1. If you have items you'd like to donate, bring them to LA 210.




Fulbright Information Meeting

What is the Universal Declaration of Human Rights?

Following the Second World War, the international community wanted to ensure that the atrocities of the war never happened again. This led to the drafting of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights (UDHR), consisting of 30 articles, which was adopted by the UN General Assembly in 1948. Now, 75 years later, the world has evolved, raising the question—what does the Universal Declaration of Human Rights mean for us today?

75th Anniversary of the Declaration of Human Rights

This year marks the 75th Anniversary of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights. This document was written by representatives from all over the world and was adopted by the UN General Assembly in Paris on December 10th, 1948. To honor the 75th year of this first document of fundamental human rights, we are highlighting a few articles each month.



We are all equal before the law and are entitled to equal protection of the law. All are equal before the law and are entitled without any discrimination to equal protection of the law. All are entitled to equal protection against any discrimination in violation of this Declaration and against any incitement to such discrimination.

Everyone has the right to an effective remedy by the competent national tribunals for acts violating the fundamental rights granted him by the constitution or by law.



You have the right to seek legal help if vour rights are violated.



No one has the right to wrongly imprison you or force you to leave your country. No one shall be subjected to arbitrary arrest, detention or exile.

Wolverines Around the World

Greece and Rome



Professors Aliki Milioti and Paul Monson took a group of students to Greece and Rome over the summer to explore Greek and Roman architecture. This trip was unique because the group had the exclusive opportunity to go "behind the ropes" and walk in places tourists cannot usually go. They were able to get closer looks at many iconic monuments, including the Parthenon and Acropolis, and gain a better understanding of these sites. The group was also able to tour actual excavations conducted by worldwide specialists, learning from the best. In Rome, they got to tour the Pantheon, the Vatican, and other iconic sites. Many students said that this trip was life-changing and unforgettable, and the professors are looking forward to being able to take more groups in the future.



Czech Republic



In 1993, Professor Daniel Fairbanks traveled to the city of Brno in the Czech Republic for the first time to visit the place where Gregor Mendel conducted his foundational experiments on genetics. On that trip, he had the amazing opportunity to photograph and later publish Mendel's annotations in his personal copy of Darwin's Origin of Species. Since

then, he has returned to the Czech Republic multiple times as a Mendel specialist. This past September, Daniel had the opportunity to return to conduct research on Mendel. For this trip, Donna Fairbanks and Hilary Demske, who are professors of music here at UVU, had the opportunity to record the Sonata for Violin and Piano by Leoš Janáček, a Czech composer who was the choirmaster in the St. Thomas Augustinian Abbey where Mendel was abbot. In 2022, Daniel was commissioned to paint a portrait of Mendel in

honor of Mendel's 200th birthday, which is on exhibit in the Mendel Museum located in abbey where Mendel lived for most of his life. For this most recent trip, at the request of the museum, Daniel painted and delivered a portrait of Janáček. He described the experience as "art, science, music, and history all coming together" with three UVU faculty members. It was an overall marvelous trip and one that will stand out in memory for all involved."



Global Community Advisory Board Meeting

On Tuesday, October 24, we held our semiannual advisory board meeting, which focused on the past and the future of the Office for Global Engagement. The meeting included a review of events our office has conducted in recent months. Such events include the AUDII conference, the promotion of the United Nations Declaration of Human Rights, our international faculty and staff networking socials, and the really really free market, among many others.
