


HISTORY OF UTAH VALLEY STATE COLLEGE

Utah Valley State College, Orem, is situated in the heart of Utah County. Nestled beneath mountains on all sides, the name Utah Valley has become synonymous with Utah County and is used interchangeably throughout the state. With a population of nearly 400,000, it is the second largest county in the State and includes over twenty incorporated cities. The College serves primarily the Mountainland Region of students with Utah County residents comprising approximately seventy percent of its enrollment.

The College was established when the Utah State Legislature passed an appropriation of \$100,000 for the biennium of 1936-38 for vocational education. And now, in 2005, Utah Valley State College offers over 32 four-year programs.

Central Utah residents, who had been supported by government funding, wanted to upgrade their skills in order to obtain better jobs, and many enrolled in vocational classes administered by the school districts. However, the school districts were not able to give adequate supervision to organize, conduct, coordinate, and supervise adult programs, and in the spring of 1938, Hyrum E. Johnson of Provo was appointed supervisor of vocational education for Utah and Heber Valleys.

In the fall of 1941, the scattered classes throughout the two valleys were moved to a central location in south Provo, where the staff and students enthusiastically welcomed the Fairgrounds Campus. Provo School District assumed the financial supervision of the new school and both federal and state monies flowed through the District to the school. It became imperative that the school have proper identification and the name Central Utah Vocational School was selected. With the advent of World War II, most of the school's operating budget came from federal government funds for war production training.

The birth of the school as a state institution was March 15, 1945, when Governor Herbert B. Maw signed a bill appropriating \$50,000 to operate for the biennium of 1945-47. A second bill was introduced and adopted in 1947

making the school a permanent state institution without any cut-off date. In 1946 Wilson W. Sorensen was appointed director of the school by the Utah State Board for Vocational Education and was the chief executive officer until June 1982.

In 1948 a new site, located between 1200 and 1400 North on 150 East in Provo, was obtained. The site was purchased by the four school districts (Alpine, Nebo, Provo and Wasatch) as well as Provo City and Utah County, with the understanding, if the property were given to the school; the state would appropriate the money for buildings. The location of the campus was considered ideal because of accessibility to students from Provo High School, the Vocational School, or Brigham Young University.

In March 1953, the name of the school was changed from Central Utah Vocational School to Utah Trade Technical Institute. In March 1967, the name was again changed, this time to Utah Technical College at Provo. In February 1966, the Utah State Board for Vocational Education approved granting Associate of Applied Science Degrees and on July 14, 1967, the State Board approved offering general education courses. In August of 1971, the Associate of Science Degree was approved.

Enrollment growth became so immense, the Provo Campus was no longer adequate and a search for a new site began. Several locations in Provo and Orem were reviewed and a decision was made to purchase 185 acres in southwest Orem. This location was chosen because of its landscape, excellent traffic flow, and accessibility. The business education building, student center, heating plant, and auto trades building were occupied at the beginning of the 1976-77 school year.

In 1974 the Associate of Science Degree was discontinued, but approval was given by the Board of Regents to again award the degree in December 1980. In 1981 the Legislature approved granting an Associate of Science Degree in general education on a three-year probationary basis with permanent approval in 1985.

On June 1, 1982, Wilson W. Sorensen retired as President, and the Board of Regents selected Dr. J. Marvin Higbee as the new President.

Since the move to the Orem Campus, the College continued to grow with a trades building, learning resource center, athletic center and administration building added. As classes and service facilities were moved from Provo to Orem, the vacated areas were filled by new programs, thus maintaining a split campus. A new science building was occupied in fall 1989. An extensive addition to the Learning Resource building was completed for use in 1992.

Beginning fall quarter 1985, articulation was completed with Weber State College to offer a four-year bachelor's degree in electronic technology while students continue their advanced courses on this campus. In winter quarter 1987, the same opportunity was offered students in the computer information systems program.

In 1987, the legislature approved a name change better reflecting the location and mission of the College—Utah Valley Community College.

In October 1987, Dr. J. Marvin Higbee resigned as President, and Dr. Lucille T. Stoddard was appointed Acting President until a new chief executive officer was selected.

Dr. Kerry D. Romesburg was appointed President of Utah Valley Community College on July 17, 1988.

The Board of Regents approved the Associate of Arts Degree in 1987. In 1989, the Regents and State Legislature approved funding for the Associate Degree Nursing program.

On October 21, 1988, the College was granted permission by the State Board of Regents to convert from the quarter to the semester calendar system. This change became effective fall semester 1990.

In 1989, the College added an International Studies Center to coordinate exchange programs, bring international students on campus, and assist in giving faculty exchange opportunities. During this same period, Utah Valley Community College became one of the first community colleges in the United States to sign an exchange agreement with Soviet Russia. Exchange agreements were reached with Central America and Caribbean countries, China, Hong Kong, Japan, Taiwan and Germany.

A four-year accounting program became available to students beginning fall semester 1990, through Utah State University.

On August 1, 1991, Dr. Sharon Staples was appointed Director of the new University Center and assumed responsibility for bachelor's degree programs in accounting, criminal justice, and electronic engineering technology. These programs were offered on the UVSC campus, and degrees were awarded through Utah State and Weber State Universities.

On January 17, 1992, the Utah State Board of Regents directed Utah Valley Community College and the Commissioner of Higher Education to develop a proposed model or plan for offering a limited number of high demand bachelor's degree programs directed to the needs of the region. The Regents' action directed that the model include the following: full data on costs with a 5-year projection, enrollment projections, program offerings, deployment of faculty, quality safeguards, accreditation processes, library and other requirements.

On July 1, 1993, the Board of Regents changed the name of the College to Utah Valley State College, and UVSC was given provisional accreditation by Northwest Accrediting Association to offer four-year degree programs in Business Management, Computer Science and Information Systems, and Technology Management. The mission of the college was expanded to include four-year degree programs. At the same time, UVSC became the first U.S. institution to receive accreditation for programs offered in the former Soviet Union.

During the 1993-94 school year, construction was completed on the Student Center Expansion and the new Theater. The Northwest Accrediting Association granted accreditation on June 22, 1994.

The spring of 1995 saw the retirement of Dr. Tom Perkins as Women's Basketball Coach. During a 12-year span, his teams compiled 275 wins and 46 losses, the highest winning percentage of any active junior college coach.

On December 14, 1995, the Northwest Association of Schools and Colleges granted full accreditation for all programs offered by the College, including the baccalaureate programs.

The Special Events Center was completed in January of 1996. The facility was named the David O. McKay Events Center after a multimillion-dollar anonymous donation. The arena is a multi-purpose facility that will not only meet the need for physical education class space, but also is home to many community events. In January of 1997, the single game attendance record for any National Junior College Athletic Association team was set. The NBA-like atmosphere was witnessed by 8,063 fans.

The fall semesters of 1996 and 1997 brought Elementary Education and Hospitality Management as new four-year degrees, respectively. A two-year Dental Hygiene program was also added in January 1998.

The new Mountainland Advanced Technology Center (MATC) building was completed in May 1998; they were previously housed at the Provo Campus. The MATC is a job-preparation and skills upgrade source for the Mountainland region.

In the fall of 1999, UVSC saw enrollment of over 20,000 students. UVSC also began construction on a new Information Science Building. The buildings first and second floors began holding classes in the fall of 2001. The third and fourth floors were completed and occupied by November of 2001.

The 2000-year was a great year for women's athletics. The women's softball team brought home UVSC's first national championship. Jed Gibson was named the national coach of the year for women's cross-country, and Sam Atoa was named the national coach of the year for women's volleyball.

In the summer of 2000, construction to expand the Student Center began, and UVSC purchased and remodeled the Utah County Journal Building on the southeast corner of campus.

The summer of 2001 held a number of traffic and pakring construction projects including a new roundabout and road located on the southeast corner of campus and four new parking lots were completed.

In August 2002, Dr. Kerry D. Romesburg resigned as President, and Dr. Lucille T. Stoddard was appointed Acting President until a new chief executive officer could be selected.

In the summer of 2002 construction began on the Wasatch Campus which was completed in June of 2003 and is now occupied. The Liberal Arts Building, located on the north side of the PE Building, was also completed in the summer of 2003 and is also now occupied.

On June 1, 2003, Dr. William A, Sederburg was appointed as President of Utah Valley State College.

As of July 1, 2003, UVSC Athletics officially entered NCAA Division I and is considered Independent, until being accepted into a conference. At the end of a six year provisional period, UVSC Athletics will achieve full active membership.

On October 15, 2003, in a press conference held on the baseball field at Utah Valley State College, UVSC president William A. Sederburg and UVSC director of athletics Mike Jacobsen announced the construction of a new baseball stadium that will replace the existing facility. The stadium will be named Parkway Crossing Stadium. The naming is in response to a \$1.7 million dollar donation by Heath Johnston and Craig Pickering, owners of Parkway Crossing, a large

student housing complex just west of the UVSC campus. Currently the overall project is estimated between \$3.3 and \$3.8 million.

Not only will the new stadium be home to the UVSC Wolverines, it will also serve as home for minor-league baseball team Provo Angels. Permanent seating in the stadium will exceed 3,100 seats. There will be 2,500 chair seats with another 600 bleacher seats. Burm seating around the outfield could push capacity over 4,000. The multi-million dollar stadium will include office and training spaces, suites, press box, batting tunnels, locker rooms, concessions, and all the trappings of a premier college and minor league facility.

Construction on Parkway Crossing Stadium began in the spring of 2004 with its official opening planned for March of 2005.

The Orem Owlz Professional Baseball Club, along with Utah Valley State College and Pacific States Cast Iron Pipe Company, hosted a ground breaking ceremony on November 17, 2004, to commence the construction of the Pacific States Kids Play Area at Parkway Crossing Stadium.

The play area is made possible by a \$75,000 donation from Pacific States Cast Iron Pipe Company. The donation will add another dimension of family fun to the Parkway Crossing Stadium.

In an effort to ease traffic congestion at the main entrance to the campus, construction of a new hook ramp that bypasses the roundabout, from Campus Drive onto University Parkway, was completed during the summer of 2004.



ENROLLMENT COMPARISON


Annualized FTE Students - Budget Related


ENROLLMENT HISTORY

Spring Semesters 2000-2004








RESIDENT/NON-RESIDENT HEADCOUNT




PART-TIME/FULL-TIME HEADCOUNT










MALE/FEMALE HEADCOUNT


EDUCATION & GENERAL OPERATING FUNDS USE EXPENDITURE CATEGORY 2004-2005




EDUCATION & GENERAL OPERATING FUNDS EXPENDITURE PURPOSE 2004-2005




EDUCATION & GENERAL REVENUE SOURCES 2004-2005


