ENGL 1010 - Introduction to Academic Writing

Semesters Taught: Spring 2020

Course Description: Teaches rhetorical knowledge and skills, focusing on critical reading, writing, and thinking. Introduces writing for specific academic audiences and situations. Emphasizes writing as a process through multiple drafts and revisions.

ENGL 2010 - Intermediate Writing: Academic Writing and Research

Semesters Taught: Fall 2019

Course Description: Emphasizes academic inquiry and research. Explores issues from multiple perspectives. Teaches careful reasoning, argumentation, and rhetorical awareness of purpose, audience, and genre. Focuses on critically evaluating, effectively integrating, and properly documenting sources.

AL AKHAWAYN UNIVERSITY IN IFRANE (Morocco)

ENG 1301 – English Composition I

- Semesters Taught: Spring 2015, Spring 2016, Fall 2016, Spring 2017, Summer 2017, Fall 2017, Spring 2018, Fall 2018, Spring 2019, Summer 2019
- *Course Description:* This course introduces students to the essay genres of reflecting, reporting, explaining, and arguing. This involves writing several genres of academic essays following the process approach to construction, including four out-of-class essays. Additional exercises deemed important for learning fluent and accurate writing are assigned from a course rhetoric/grammar text and other supplementary material.

ENG 2303 – Technical Communication

Semesters Taught: Fall 2016, Fall 2017

Course Description: This course is designed to perfect writing skills necessary for advanced undergraduate writing in the School of Science and Engineering (SSE) courses and for future writing tasks in professional contexts. The course emphasizes writers' abilities to analyze and synthesize information and to incorporate it into concise, clear, and ethical texts. Coursework includes writing effective emails, memos, instructions, proposals, technical reports, cover/job letters, and professional CVs/Résumés.

List of Courses Taught (continued)

FAS 0210 - Fundamental Academic Strategies

Semesters Taught: Fall 2014, Spring 2015, Summer 2015, Spring 2017

Course Description: The first stage of this course introduces the basic learning and study skills required by students to succeed at university. They are trained to take responsibility for their own learning through tasks that require them to reflect on, as well as evaluate, their current study habits and learn how to implement proper strategies to improve their learning. In the second stage of this course, students are educated in the foundations of information literacy.

FAS 1220 - Introduction to Critical Thinking

Semesters Taught: Fall 2014, Spring 2015, Spring 2016, Summer 2016

Course Description: This course enables students to develop an understanding of the critical thinking process, with a view to improving their own reasoning skills. Students are introduced to key concepts used in critical thinking, shown how to examine the evidence for a claim, and trained to analyze different types of evidence, including personal experience, appeal to authority, and statistical arguments.

LIT 2301 – World Literature

Semesters Taught: Fall 2018

Course Description: This course is designed to give students a generous sampling of the major works of World Literature. Using a multi-disciplinary approach, the course focuses on reading, analyzing, and discussing works drawn from the various historical periods and genres. Works from various geo-cultural regions, aboriginal, and immigrant writers, and from male and female writers are included.

LIT 3310 – American Literature: Survey(s)

Semesters Taught: Spring 2019 (Independent Study)

Course Description: This course is designed to give students a generous sampling of the major works of American Literature. Using a multi-disciplinary approach, the course focuses on reading, analyzing, and discussing works drawn from the various historical periods and genres in the United States, the Caribbean, Latin America, and/or South America. Students read and analyze a variety of literary genres, including fiction, non-fiction, poetry, and drama.

LIT 3371 – African Literature

Semesters Taught: Fall 2017

Course Description: This course explores different genres of contemporary African literature, such as the short story, poetry (including the oral tradition), drama, fiction, and non-fiction. Topics such as religion, culture, the impact of colonialism, and negritude are discussed.

NEW MEXICO STATE UNIVERSITY - CARLSBAD (New Mexico, U.S.A.)

English 111G – Rhetoric and Composition (online and face-to-face)

Semesters Taught: Spring 2013, Summer 2013 (online), Fall 2013, Spring 2014, Summer 2014 (online) Course Description: Students learn the processes necessary for conducting research and for

incorporating research material in writing. They learn how to evaluate, cite, and document primary and secondary research sources, and how to develop arguments and support them with sound evidence.

English 203G – Business and Professional Communication (online)

Semesters Taught: Summer 2013 (online), Summer 2014 (online)

Course Description: This course investigates the theory and practice of writing and oral presentation for professionals. The course emphasizes preparing effective written products for both professional and academic settings. Emphasis is placed on understanding a rhetorical approach to writing, which includes audience expectation and audience forecasting.

English 211G - Writing in the Humanities and Social Sciences (online and face-to-face)

Semesters Taught: Spring 2013, Fall 2013 (online), Spring 2014

Course Description: This course teaches the theory and practice in interpreting texts from various disciplines in the humanities and social sciences. Strategies for researching, evaluating, constructing, and writing researched arguments are employed. Student research is centered on cultures, subcultures, and artifacts produced by those cultures.

English 218G – Technical and Scientific Communication

Semesters Taught: Spring 2013

Course Description: ENGL 218 investigates the theory and practice of writing in the technical and scientific professional fields. The course emphasizes preparing effective written products for both academic and professional settings. Emphasis is placed on understanding audience expectation and forecasting audience response.

CCDE 105N – Effective Communication Skills

Semesters Taught: Spring 2013

Course Description: CCDE 105 is a developmental English course which employs the rhetorical approach to writing, speaking, reading, and listening. Students practice and develop an effective writing process through a workshop format.

CCDE 110N – General Composition

Semesters Taught: Summer 2013, Fall 2013, Spring 2014

Course Description: CCDE 110 is a developmental writing course, employing a rhetorical approach to writing, reading, and grammar. Students practice and develop an effective writing process through a workshop format. The readings and course work provide the basis for a series of brief writing assignments, culminating in thesis-driven three-to-five page essays.

UNIVERSITY OF NEVADA, LAS VEGAS (Nevada, U.S.A.)

English 101 – Composition I

Semesters Taught: Fall 2007, Fall 2011

Course Description: A writing intensive course designed to improve critical thinking, reading, and writing skills by providing students practical guidance in writing the short, 3 – 5 page, focused, thesis-driven, college paper. Students develop strategies for turning their experience, observations, and analyses into evidence suitable for writing in a variety of academic disciplines.

English 101 E/F – Extended Composition I

Semesters Taught: Spring 2008, Fall 2008, Summer 2009, Fall 2009, Spring 2010, Summer 2010, Summer 2011, Fall 2012

Course Description: English 101E/F covers the same material as a regular English 101 course (see above), but is designed to be taken over two semesters for those students whose tests indicated they needed additional practice in their writing.

English 102 – Composition II

Semesters Taught: Spring 2009

Course Description: English 102 builds upon the critical thinking, reading, and writing capabilities that students developed in English 101 (see above). Students learn the processes necessary for conducting research and for incorporating research material in writing.

English 241 - Survey of Early American Literature

Semesters Taught: Spring 2011

Course Description: English 241 introduces students to major figures and movements in American Literature from the Colonial Period to the Civil War. The class examines major movements, religions, and philosophies seen through early American Literature.

English 232 – World Literature II

Semesters Taught: Fall 2010, Spring 2011, Fall 2011, Spring 2012

Course Description: An introductory survey of various world cultures and literatures from the mid-17th century to present day. Students read works in English as well as many translated from other languages. They look at how these works can be understood and appreciated in relation to their historical, cultural, and literary contexts.
