It is my privilege to introduce the UVU Center for Social Impact's inaugural Impact Report as we celebrate five years of impact programming. Summer Valente, our previous director, had the foresight and vision to take a leap by evolving our space from its original, wonderful iteration as the Center for Volunteer and Service-Learning to the Center for Social Impact. She recognized the need for a more holistic approach to social change and community improvement, one that aligns with an increasingly interconnected, fast-paced, and complex world.

Over the past five years, we have continually researched, adapted, and integrated best-practice frameworks that now shape our Strategic Impact Continuum. Relational Care, Social Change Design (which includes systems thinking, theory of change, and impact measurement), and the Six Pathways of Social Impact serve as our core strategies. Our guiding frameworks have been especially critical as we've navigated a rapidly shifting world—one marked by a global pandemic, political and social upheaval, unprecedented natural disasters, and international conflict. Through it all, our students remain a source of hope and inspiration. They seek ways to strengthen their local communities, contribute to a healthier society, and extend care beyond their immediate circles. The strategic tools we provide have never been more relevant as they tackle deep, interwoven social and environmental challenges.





Growing with Purpose: The Shift to Social Impact


Five years ago, UVU's Volunteer and Service-Learning Center became the Center for Social Impact—a transformation that redefined how UVU students engage in social change. Summer Valente, the director who led this shift, recognized that UVU need more in regard to community-driven engagement than just volunteer coordination. She envisioned a space where students could analyze real world social issues and become changemaking leaders in community movements.

As Summer conducted research, she came across Stanford's Public Service and Civic Engagement Pathways. These became the foundation for the Pathways of Social Impact framework, which expanded the Center's focus beyond direct service and community-engaged learning and research to include social entrepreneurship and corporate social responsibility, policy and governance, community organizing and activism, and philanthropy. This shift aligned with a core belief: college students have always been at the forefront of major social movements—and UVU students should be, too. The adoption of this framework, along with the creation of additional models, was designed with students in mind—ensuring they could see themselves in this work while equipping them with the skills to create strategic change in their communities and spheres of influence.

Change wasn't easy. The name itself sparked skepticism, and some resisted moving beyond traditional service. But the team remained clear and strategic, advocating for a rigorous, research-backed approach that could withstand scrutiny. A major challenge was the shift away from a charity mindset toward systemic change. "The old model had an unintentional savior complex," Summer reflected. "We needed students to engage with communities in a meaningful, reciprocal way."

Today, the Center for Social Impact attracts hundreds of students with its events, course offerings, competitions, and alternative breaks. More students than ever are applying to be Impact Fellows and Impact Associates. The work continues to expand and evolve in exciting ways. Looking ahead, our commitment to growth and adaptability remains strong. "The world is changing, and the work of social impact has to evolve with it," Summer said. Five years in, this is just the beginning.

What is Social Impact?



Social Impact refers to lasting positive change created by individuals, organizations, and communities working to address pressing, community-identified social issues in a sustainable and just manner. At UVU's Center for Social Impact, it means engaging in meaningful action to increase well-being, promote justice, and strengthen communities through hopeful research, strategy, advocacy, and action.






What is the Strategic Impact Continuum?




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

Guiding Frameworks





Relational Care is all about understanding and honoring our deep connections to each other and the world around us. Rooted in the communal practices of Indigenous Peoples and the justice-centered theories of liberation and civil rights scholars, this philosophy reminds us that impact isn't just about outcomes—it's about how we get there. Relational Care is a commitment to recognize and responsibly engage with the interconnectedness of all things across systemic, communal, and interpersonal spheres. It guides collaborative social impact strategy based on an understanding

of mutual

dependence.

Social Change Design is our playbook for tackling social issues in a way that's collaborative, community-led, and resultsdriven. We integrate this approach into all social impact planning and execution because it ensures solutions are designed with the people they affect in mind. At its core, Social Change Design follows three key steps that make problemsolving more intentional and effective: Systems Thinking helps us understand the full context of an issue, Theory of Change ensures our ideas have a clear and strategic pathway to impact, and Impact Measurement holds us accountable for real results. By incorporating these steps, we move beyond quick fixes to create sustainable, meaningful change.






Guiding Frameworks



The Six Pathways of Social Impact framework helps people to create change in ways that align with their strengths, skills, and passions across disciplines in addition to ways that align with the unique gaps of any given social issue. Developed through a collaboration led by Stanford University's Haas Center for Public Service, the pathways acknowledge that there's no single "right way" to make an impact. The beauty of these pathways? They're fluid. You might engage in multiple pathways throughout your career—or even in a single project. Impact is dynamic, and so are the ways we contribute.



Social Impact Metrics Lab

What is the SIMLab?

The SIMLab brings together faculty, students, and community partners to tackle real-world challenges through impact assessment and design projects. Our three Strategy Fellows, trained in social change design and community partner consulting, worked alongside research assistants to conduct in-depth audits for local organizations. Each project led to a customized assessment report and a follow-up design project aimed at closing identified impact gaps—all rooted in community need.



The Refuge Utah

The Refuge Utah is dedicated to supporting survivors of domestic violence and sexual assault. This year, our student team partnered with them to research gaps in reporting on college campuses. Using their findings, the team created a website and assembled resource packets to better support student survivors and connect them with the help they need.

Bre Lambert



Bre Lambert was an Impact Fellow while studying in the social work master's program at UVU. During her time as a Fellow, she hosted the Impact Fellows podcast and participated in the Oxford Map the System competition, examining disparities in mental health for Black Utahns. Since her fellowship, Lambert has become a fully licensed therapist working with students at the University of Utah's counseling center. She uses skills ranging from organizational strategy to systems thinking and justice-centered design. Bre shared, "Systems theory and how to look at things from a bird's eye view has been so beneficial to the clinical work I do as a therapist...I actually [recently gave] a training on how I use design centered thinking for clinical work, which I'm really excited about."

Maya Hardie



Maya Hardie participated in one the Center's first social change design projects, providing systems research and strategic advice to Waste Less Solutions, a local food rescue nonprofit. After her fellowship, Hardie became the assistant director of Phase Two Productions, a full-service video production company based in Salt Lake. While there, she's identified gaps and potential solutions by surveying crew members and implemented an improved training program based on her research. She stated, "[I launched a] program through all of those methodologies that I learned at the Center for Social Impact. And then I think those same methodologies just continue to show up...I don't know how I would have approached something like that before The Center for Social Impact."





Hamid Impact Fellow, 2021-2022 She/Her

Deeqa Hamid, a refugee from Sudan who worked with the UN before seeking asylum in the United States, created the Center's inaugural Impact Speaker Series. Hamid is finishing her master's program in social work and mental health and is completing a practicum to become a licensed therapist. Reflecting on her journey, Hamid credits the Center for equipping her with the skills and confidence to engage with communities. "Before being a Fellow, I didn't know where to start," she explained. "Being a part of this program, I learned how to be bold, how to drive myself, how to ask the right questions, and how to be involved."



Taylor

Impact Fellow, 2020 - 2021 He/Him

Taylor Bell was UVU's student body president for the 2019-2020 academic year before becoming an Impact Fellow who ran the Center's inaugural Impact Fellows podcast. Currently, Bell is pursuing a master's degree in fashion design management at the London College of Fashion, where he is utilizing the tools and skills he gained from the Center to navigate sustainability problems within the fashion industry. "Learning [systems and design] tools and understanding the processes and types of complexity of systems has been very important," attests Bell. "And I think just having not only the skills...but the vocabulary. There is a strong correlation [to those tools] in talking about problems in a productive, educated way."



Impact Exhibits

One of our core goals is to make data and social challenges more visual, accessible, and engaging—not just through reports or presentations, but by transforming them into immersive exhibits that encourage learning, dialogue, and reflection.

These exhibits reflect our belief that storytelling and data can work hand in hand to create understanding and drive action. Whether through shirts covered in handwritten experiences or graphs showing the imbalance of wealth, the goal is the same: to help students and visitors see the systems, hear the stories, and feel the urgency.

Our exhibits aren't just events—they're learning labs for empathy, systems thinking, and social impact. And as we look ahead, we're committed to expanding these efforts, inviting more students, faculty, and community partners to see data differently —as art, as story, as call to action.



CLOTHESLINE PROJECT

SCARCITY MYTH





The Clothesline Project is an annual visual exhibit centered on raising awareness about sexual and domestic violence.

Rows of hand-decorated t-shirts—each created by a survivor or someone who has known a survivor—share powerful personal stories, emotions, and messages of resilience. Each shirt color represents a different person's lived experience. Coordinated by the Pathways Fellows, the project also involved collaboration with community partners to deepen its impact, such as a presentation from The Refuge Utah.

The Scarcity Myth is an interactive exhibit meant to debunk the myth that food, housing, and wealth insecurity is due to a scarcity of resources, and rather raise awareness about uneven distribution. Participants engage in visual data displays, a showcase of community resources, and interactive activities, in order to gain inspiration about various ways communities can work to provide access to basic needs. The Pathways Fellows coordinated this exhibit, as well as communications with relevant community partners in order to host a panel discussion with experts from the UVU Care Hub, UVU Student Success Center, and Salt Lake Community Mutual Aid. The conversation explored collaborative approaches to creating systems of care and access.

+ Commemoration

As part of Martin Luther King, Jr. Commemoration Week at UVU, the Center for Social Impact curated a special exhibit showcasing the connection between art and justice. The exhibit featured gold and black designs and highlighted influential Black artists whose work has shaped cultural and social movements. Artists included Beyoncé, Lupe Fiasco, and Kendrick Lamar. The exhibit provided historical context on each artist, their significance, and the ways in which their music and artistry have contributed to movements for justice.

The Center was also heavily involved with the Commemoration keynote event and breakout sessions. The annual Commemoration continues to be a profound and inspiring experience that draws on community to honor Dr. King's legacy in the fight for justice. We look forward to continuing our tradition of supporting MLK, Jr. Commemoration at UVU, and helping to expand its impact in the years to come.





On Thursday, January 23, 2025, UVU celebrated its 31st Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Commemoration! This vibrant and inspiring event aligned with the theme "Creating the Dream - Artistic Expressions of Justice." The celebration showcased performers who honored Martin Luther King Jr.'s legacy through poetry, music, dance, and visual art. As contributors to the event, CSI staff members Cassie Bingham and Jamey Williams played key roles in leading this year's program through outreach, organization, and visionary planning.

Dr. King once said, "Almost always, the creative dedicated minority has made the world better." This year's theme embodied that message, emphasizing the power of artistic expression in the fight for justice. Art has long been a force for social change, amplifying voices of those often unheard, fostering empathy, and inspiring collective action.





Four performers from our Utah community took the stage. each presenting a unique artistic interpretation of justice and equality. The audience was able to watch films of each performer introducing themselves and explaining why their art related to the work of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.

Jamera NaQuai - A spoken word poet who performed a written piece entitled "I, Too, Have A Dream."

Ngoma y'Africa – An African cultural group that performed a traditional African dance celebrating heritage and resistance.

Yahosh Bonner – A musical performer that highlighted themes of unity and empowerment from his own lived experience.

Shalandrea Houchen (What's Ya Vibe) - A multifaceted artistic performer that combined singing, dancing, and live painting, captivating the audience with a visual and auditory narrative of justice and activism.






Oxford Map the System

A Research Competition

During the fall semester, UVU students participated in the annual Oxford Map the System local competition hosted by the Center for Social Impact, where 13 teams researched local social issues they are passionate about, using systems thinking—a method of analyzing how interconnected elements contribute to complex problems. Through a series of workshops and mentorship, students developed systems maps and visual presentations that explored the roots of issues affecting their communities.

The Map the System competition has grown every year since it started at UVU in partnership with Oxford, and we are looking forward to expanding the competition, collaborating with other universities and centers, and strengthening systems thinking education. The Center also aims to increase student participation and engagement with systems mapping skills.

2025 Winners Janessa Purcell & McKay Jones

This year's Map the System winners, McKay Jones and Janessa Purcell, explored the impact of air pollution on marginalized communities in West Valley City, here in Utah. Janessa and McKay made it a priority to pair their in-depth secondary research with lived experience from community members directly impacted by the issue. By talking to these community members, they learned about how important data and research on this topic remains inaccessible to frontline community members. This inspired Jones and Purcell to organize an event where these community members could share their experiences, ensuring the research remains accessible and centered on those with lived experience. As the first place winners, they will travel to Oxford University this summer to compete at the global level.

At the Center for Social Impact, we take pride in our close collaboration with Academic Affairs—a partnership that is vital to our mission. We support faculty training and help run the university's service-learning courses, which provide students with immersive, project-based experiences that bridge classroom theory with real-world practice. Service learning empowers students to apply academic concepts to address pressing societal challenges. By working with community partners, students not only deepen their academic knowledge but also hone critical skills such as leadership, problem solving, and civic responsibility. One professor described it best: "Service learning creates high-impact experiences that students carry with them, shaping their personal and professional growth."





Student Spotlight

Shaping Future Leaders through Social Change Design



At the Center for Social Impact, we strive to equip students with tangible skills that extend beyond an educational environment —tools they can take with them into their careers, communities, and personal lives. For Kayla Torres, these skills have become the foundation of her work in mentoring, advocacy, and systems change.

Kayla first encountered systems thinking through the Map the System competition, where she and her team explored the contributing factors of LGBTQ+ suicide in Utah. That experience opened her eyes to the power of mapping complex issues and inspired her to dive deeper by joining the Center's Impact Fellows program as a Strategy and Design Fellow.


Now, Kayla isn't just learning these frameworks—she's applying them every day. Through her work with The Refuge, an organization focused on sexual violence prevention and survivor support, she has taken a complex, undefined challenge and broken it down into something valuable. Using tools like problem memos and Gantt charts, she structured her approach and built strategies that are now helping The Refuge assess gaps in survivor resources.

"The frameworks I learned at the Center gave me clarity," Kayla says. "They helped me understand where to start and how to move forward. Without them, I would have been lost in the ambiguity." Beyond her work with The Refuge, Kayla has taken what she's learned and brought it directly into her community. She founded the Changemakers Collective, a club focused on systems thinking, and now teaches these concepts to students at a juvenile facility.

Kayla is currently integrating everything she has learned at the Center into her capstone project, where she is refining how she teaches social change frameworks to the youth she mentors. Her approach is rooted in lived experience, practical application, and the deep belief that knowledge should lead to action. "I didn't just learn about impact strategy—I learned how to use it," she says. "And now, I get to pass that knowledge on to others. By teaching them how to understand and navigate complex systems, she's giving these students the tools to take control of their futures. She believes that when people can see their place within a system, they can begin to change it. Looking ahead, Kayla is determined to keep applying and sharing the strategies she's developed. She plans to pursue a career in education, ensuring that systems thinking remains a resource for future generations.

"This experience has only strengthened my conviction to become a professor," she says. "Systems thinking is a dying art, but it's crucial for marginalized communities. I want to keep it alive and pass these tools on to as many students as I can."

Through her leadership, Kayla is directly contributing to the Center's mission of developing compassionate community leaders. Her work exemplifies how students can move beyond learning theory to applying real-world solutions—driving change not just for themselves, but for the communities they serve.

Dr. Jonathan Westover is stepping down as the Academic Director of the Center for Social Impact after over a decade of leadership, leaving behind an incredible legacy of growth and impact. When he first took on the role, service learning at UVU engaged about 2,500 students annually—now, that number has grown to nearly 9,500, with faculty participation more than doubling. "We've seen a steady maturity of service learning over the years," Westover reflects, crediting the shift toward project-based experiences that give students real-world skills while making a meaningful impact in the community.

Beyond the numbers, Westover's influence helped shape the strategic direction of the UVU Center for Social Impact and played a key role in launching UVU's long-anticipated Social Impact minor and certificate (read more to the left). His dedication to creating impactful learning experiences has left a lasting mark, and his work will continue to shape service learning and social impact at UVU for years to come.
