This course teaches students the foundational theory behind financial accounting and how to think critically about how financial standards should be applied. The course will also focus on the use of financial accounting research tools (the FASB codification) to research and apply current and potential U.S. GAAP. Finally, the class will provide opportunities for students to prepare to take the Financial Accounting and Reporting (FAR) section of the CPA Exam.
