Explores fundamental methods and techniques of oil painting from the figure using live models (draped and undraped). Emphasizes mastery of representational depictions of the figure. Includes themes of abstraction, interpretation, and narrative uses of the figure. May be repeated for a maximum of 6 credits toward graduation.

Generative AI

AI: Artistic creativity is about making choices and develops in the context in which an artist works and the world we inhabit. This cannot be replicated using machine learning, which is just a data-driven tool. Parts of the creative process can be automated in interesting ways using AI, but the creative decision-making which results in artworks cannot be replicated by current AI technology.

Appropriate use of AI can include brainstorming, ideation and editing, AI generated works alone are not protected by copyright laws and are not considered creative works. Galleries and Museums do not currently allow AI works to be accepted or displayed currently.
