Student Learning Outcomes

- Discuss significant historical aviation events in chronological order regarding the progress of aviation.
- Identify aviation applications including aerospace technology and terminology.
- Identify the structures of aircraft and spacecraft.
- Explain the physics/principles of flight, including how Bernoulli's principle of pressure/fluid motion and Newton's third law of motion are used to develop lift.
- Explain aircraft and spacecraft stability and flight control operations.
- Demonstrate how aviation regulations and laws are developed and administered.
- Identify basic weather patterns, use Boyle's law of temperature and pressure to determine weather conditions and their effect on flight operations.
- Identify physiological conditions that effect the human body in flight and know the recommended procedures for dealing with these conditions.

- Investigate aviation/aerospace career opportunities and associated skills required in preparation for aviation employment.
