It's that time of year again: Next year school registration! If you haven't already started now is a great time to start planning the classes you will take next year. Here are some tips for creating a schedule that will help you prepare for college.



- 1 **English - 4 Years**
- 2 **Math - 3 years** (including Algebra I, Geometry, and Algebra II)
- 3 **Science - 3 years** (including Biology, Chemistry, and Physics)
- 4 **Social Studies - 3 Years**
- 5 **Foreign Language – 2 Years+** (of the same language)
- 6 **Fine Arts** (at least a couple classes)
- 7 **Concurrent Enrollment & AP classes** (especially 11th & 12th)

Another important thing to remember for future seniors is that colleges will still look at your senior schedule and some will request your senior year grades. Because of this I do not recommend taking less classes senior year. Taking a normal class load shows colleges that you are serious about your education. If you are done with the requirements to graduate take concurrent enrollment classes or classes that would help better prepare you for college or help you explore new topics or interests.

- ⇒ Take at least one dual enrollment course each year in HS
- ⇒ Attend a college/university after HS graduation
- ⇒ Earn a college degree within 6 years after HS graduation
