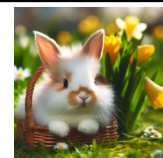

Operating with a full program has been immensely gratifying, and I eagerly anticipate fostering even greater consistency with our students.



Throughout the year, our workshops have been a highlight, empowering students at both the junior high and high school levels to excel academically, become exemplary citizens, and chart a path towards college readiness. Our MVHS seniors have been making remarkable strides in their college preparations, with all having completed their FAFSA and school scholarship applications. Now, we're directing our attention towards external scholarship applications and course registration, which marks an exciting phase in their academic journey. Meanwhile, MVHS juniors are diligently gearing up for their ACT exams, with access to TRIO's ACT prep course set to equip them for success this April! Over at Orem Junior, we've enjoyed exploring tools like YouScience, and embarking on a journey of discovering individual learning styles together.

As we approach course registration for the next academic year, I encourage all TRIO students to prioritize their path to graduation and consider maximizing opportunities like concurrent enrollment classes. The prospect of graduating high school with an associate's degree is well within reach for many of our students, and I'm committed to supporting them every step of the way. For personalized guidance on course selection or any other assistance, students can always reach out to me—I'm here to help them thrive.



A fascinating fact about an associate degree, is that individuals who hold them tend to experience higher earning potential and lower rates of unemployment compared to those with only a high school diploma. According to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS), individuals with an associate degree had median weekly earnings of \$887 in 2020, compared to \$781 for those with only a high school diploma. Additionally, the unemployment rate for individuals with an associate's degree was lower at 5.5% compared to 9.1% for those with just a high school diploma.

This demonstrates the significant economic benefits that come with obtaining an associate's degree, making it a valuable investment in one's future. It's so neat that our students have the opportunity to graduate with their associates in high school. If you would like more information about this pathway, never hesitate to reach out!

High school dropouts in the United States are more likely to be unemployed, have low-paying jobs, be incarcerated, have children at early ages and/or become single parents. There is not a single race in the U.S. that as of 2019, has a 90 percent graduation rate. In order for the U.S. to have achieved this rate by 2020, almost 200,000 more students would have had to graduate on time.

Expectations of students accepted into TRIO Talent Search:

- ⇒ Attend school regularly
- ⇒ Attend monthly ETS meetings held in your school
- ⇒ Maintain a 2.5 GPA
- ⇒ Graduate high school (HS) at the end of the 12th grade
- ⇒ Take at least one dual enrollment course each year in HS
- ⇒ Attend a college/university after HS graduation
- ⇒ Earn a college degree within 6 years after HS graduation

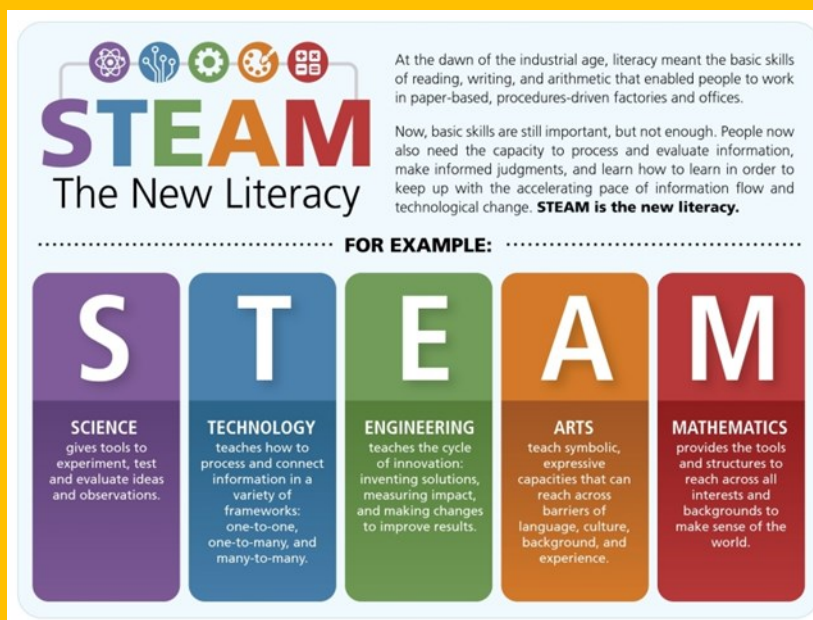


STEAM—with its focus on not only the “how” and “what” but also the “who” and “why”—is specifically designed to develop future innovators. It encourages students to

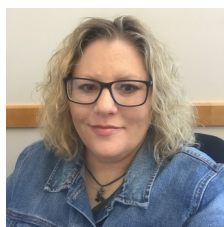

Qualifications for UVU Freshman Housing:

- **Enrolled and Registered:** You should be enrolled and registered for UVU classes.
- **Age Range:** Between the ages of 18 and 24.
- **Credit Limit:** Have 30 credits or less (excluding concurrent enrollment students).
- **Good Standing:** Maintain good standing with the UVU Student Rights & Accountability Office.
