3 benefits of starting your college education at a community or technical college:

1.Community/technical colleges offer an affordable option for any students looking to advance their education beyond high school and earn a 2-year degree.

2.Take care of all the entry-level and/or prerequisite courses needed for a bachelor's degree. By completing those classes at the community college level, students will pay much lower tuition for those credits.

3.Community/technical colleges cater to students of all backgrounds and schedules. If students are working or have family to take care of, they are more likely to find classes available at different times of the day that fits their lifestyle than they would at a 4-year college or university.

Recognizing that many students take the ACT more than once, a typical path from your first test to getting your highest scores might look something like this:

Fall of Junior Year: This is a popular time to take the ACT for the first time. It allows you to establish a baseline score, identify areas of improvement, and plan your subsequent preparation accordingly.


Spring of Junior Year: By taking the ACT again in the spring, you've given yourself time to build on your initial score and continue to refine your skills. This is particularly beneficial if you feel you need more time for preparation after your first attempt.

Fall of Senior Year: If you plan to apply early to colleges, taking the ACT in the fall of your senior year ensures your scores are available for submission. It also provides an opportunity to improve your scores further to maximize your scholarship prospects.

The Upward Bound program provided the most influential experiences that pushed me to achieve all I have so far. It gave me the confidence to reach deep and aim high. Coming from a very isolated small community, I was introduced to more diversity than I had ever known up to that point in my life. I learned about new cultures, languages, people, and ideas.

Because of my experience with the TRiO program, I was accepted into a work study program my freshman and sophomore years of college which provided for me financially and allowed me to be involved in the student success realm of work; further motivating me to keep going when college became challenging.

I believe in this program so much, that I returned after a couple of years of college and became a TC for the Upward Bound summer program in 2011, giving me the opportunity to give back to a younger generation of students, and making wonderful friendships and connections.

For those who are new to Trio, my advice is to take in as much as you can. Participate fully in the school year programs, and especially the summer college camp. Its value is more than just college credits, it is connections with new friends, new ideas, and skills that you will recall later in life. You get out of it what you put into it. I have two siblings who were part of UB who never completed their education past a few semesters. That just goes to show you can't coast through it and come out on the other side with a degree and better paying job. You have to put in the work too, but just as important you need to have fun.

I never thought I would use speed reading (Sorry Michael Campbell), but it really came in handy when I had procrastinated an assignment in college, and even now in my professional work.

I just can't say enough good things about Upward Bound, the staff I knew who put up with my immature antics, both as a student and a counselor. It truly changes lives. I entered the program a shy scared little 15-year-old and left a confident young woman ready to take on my goals!
