

Her words reflected the spirit and purpose of the Upward Bound Program, emphasizing the lasting impact it has on students' lives.

We are proud of our students who not only recognize the value of their own growth but also inspire others through their journey. Their dedication and resilience continue to be a testament to the transformative power of education and opportunity.

"My name is Melanie Rangel, and I recently graduated from Orem High School. I'm also proud to say that I've been part of the TRIO Upward Bound program at Utah Valley University for the past four years. I have had the honor of serving as this year's student president. Tonight, I want to speak from the heart about what this program has meant to me and why it matters now more than ever. Four years ago, I walked into an Upward Bound meeting not knowing it would change my life. I come from a low-income, first-generation family. My mother grew up in a home weighed down by medical bills and worry. Unfortunately, her dreams of education were pushed aside out of necessity. My father, who immigrated from Mexico, left school early to support his family. Both of my parents made enormous sacrifices so that I could have opportunities they never did.

When I think about what TRIO Upward Bound has done for me, I think about them. About how their hard work paved the way for me to follow a different path. A path that includes possibility. A path that includes dreams. Thanks to Upward Bound, I graduated with 62 college credits, (19 of them being through Upward Bound's summer program), got help with FAFSA, scholarships, college applications, and most importantly I found a second family. TRIO walked beside me when my parents didn't know how. They supported me emotionally, academically, and financially. 62 is not just a number. That is time, money, and preparation that puts me steps ahead as I begin my college journey. It's confidence. It's experience. And it's opportunity. Upward Bound gave me support where my family couldn't. Not because they didn't love me, right guys? But because they didn't have the knowledge or resources to help me navigate college applications, FAFSA, scholarships, or resumes. TRIO stepped in and said you are not alone, we got you!

Because of TRIO, I am walking into college not just prepared but empowered. I'm chasing a dream I've had since I was a kid: to become a surgeon. It's a dream my mom once told me to shoot high, but maybe look at other options just in case. And not because she didn't believe in me but out of love and protection. But I'm here to tell you this dream is real. And it's possible, because of TRIO. Upward Bound is more than a program. It is a lifeline. It is hope. It is proof that where you come from does not define where you can go. And that's why I have to say this next part not just as a student, but as a leader and advocate for the TRIO community.

Right now, TRIO programs across the country are facing the threat of being defunded. Defunding TRIO isn't just about cutting a budget; it's about cutting futures. It's about slamming doors on students who need them opened the most. Students who have the drive, the heart, and the potential but not always the means or the way. Programs like Upward Bound don't just change lives, they save them, they start them. They build bridges where there were walls. They turn "maybe someday" into "I'm doing it now".

So tonight, I stand not only as a proud TRIO Upward Bound graduate, but as a voice for every student still waiting to be given a chance. To the educators, mentors, families, and supporters in this room, thank you for believing in us. For investing in us. For fighting for us. And to those in power who hold the future of programs like this in their hands please hear me WE ARE NOT NUMBERS ON A SPREADSHEET. WE ARE STORIES. WE ARE PROOF THAT TRIO WORKS!! Let's make sure it keeps working for every student who dares to dream."
