## Hosting Mr. Richard Jordan during class on international organizations



On Tuesday the 9<sup>th</sup> of April, I was able to hear Mr. Richard Jordan who is the Dean of UN Non-governmental representatives in New York. I heard him during our international relations class here on campus.

Jordan's being here on campus was planned and executed by Joel Frost, President of the Foreign Affairs club at Utah Valley University. I was part of the team that worked alongside Joel. This lecture was only one of many different events that Joel planned for the three days that Jordan was in Utah.
