

Wild Polio Is Now Only a Plane Ride Away

Unfortunately, a new case of Wild Polio Type 1 has just been reported in a three-year-old girl in Malawi, Africa. Her paralysis started in November 2021.

Lab tests have confirmed that the virus is genetically linked to a strain that was first detected in Pakistan. It is not yet clear how the strain arrived in Malawi, nor if there are other undetected infections.



As this case is linked to strain from Pakistan, the new case does not affect the African Region's wild polio-free certification status, which was granted by the World Health Organization (WHO) in 2020.

Rotary and our partners in the GPEI (Global Polio Eradication Initiative) are actively beginning immunization and surveillance activities to prevent any further spread of the wild polio virus in Malawi.

We cannot be complacent. Please join Rotary to prevent the spread in Malawi, Afghanistan, and Pakistan by donating to the Rotary Polio fund.





A portable "shelter" you can carry with you.. Just like a turtle. The vest is high tech foam that is inexpensive and keeps a person warm to 10 degrees below zero. Also, we had a zoom call with the Rotary e-club of District 1070 in the UK. We are so excited to do whatever we can to help the UK get their "Coats for Kids" Voucher program up and running!

How It Works

- Liquid and solid waste are separated via the toilet bowl.
- Liquid waste goes to the bottom of the tank, where it evaporates.
- Solid waste remains on the drying plate, where it is dehydrated and decomposed into 5% of it's original size.
- Negative pressure prevents smells
