Keep People from Going Blind in Mexico

President Carlos Calderon of the Irapuato Villas Rotary Club in Irapuato, Central or Colonial Mexico, asks a Utah Rotary Club to help them provide Cataract Surgery for poor people. "We have ophthalmologist surgeons who have the equipment to perform the operations free of charge in terms of their services and facilities," he says. "What costs



about \$650 per surgery is the intraocular lens and medications. Could you fund 1 or 2 of these surgeries? "We can provide you the clinical history of the candidates," says President Calderon. "If we do not help them, they will go blind."



Desks for Children in Guatemala

President-Elect Maria Renée Valladares describes a situation hard to imagine—the absence of 150 school desks for children in the small community of

Miguel Petapa near Guatemala City, Guatemala. The cost per desk is \$22. You can provide the number of desks you want. Her Satellite Rotary Club of Uwara will provide the rest of the desks. Maria Renée describes a situation hard for us to imagine—in Miguel Petapa they not only have daytime school, but evening school, because during the day many children must tend younger children so both parents can work. New District Policy for Global Grants

It is the goal of the District Foundation Committee to encourage ALL clubs in the District to be involved in Global Grants. The committee is introducing a revised policy for awarding District Designated Funds (DDF) for Global Grants (GG).



Global Grant Guidelines - Effective July 1, 2023

Goal – Increasing number of clubs in our district that either apply for or actively participate in Global Grants thus educating Rotarians on International service and increasing number of International Service champions throughout District 5420.

- First Time GG Exception A club sponsoring their first GG ever will be allocated \$2 in DDF for each \$1 in club funds up to \$10,000 in DDF allocated to their project.
- As it already is, a sponsoring club can qualify for up to \$10,000 DDF for a GG if they commit a matching amount or more towards the GG, without any other contributing clubs from District 5420.

- A sponsoring club can qualify for \$15,000 DDF for a global grant if two or more other clubs in District 5420 combined contribute at least \$4,000 and the sponsoring club actively involves at least one of the other clubs in the project.
- District 5420 will reserve \$15,000 in DDF funds for clubs who have never had an approved GG. If not allocated to club(s), the \$15,000 reserve will be released into general DDF use on April 1 of each Rotary year. Therefore, clubs who have/had an approved GG (completed or in process), cannot receive DDF for their GG if that award will reduce District DDF funds below \$15,000. Effective July 1, 2023.

End of Year To-Do List: District Grants, Foundation Donations

As the end of this wonderful Rotary year rapidly approaches, there are two things that weigh heavily on my mind.

The first is **closing out your club's District Grants**. Each club that received a grant signed a contract that they would report the results of the grant and provide receipts for the material purchased with the grant money for their project. These reports will be considered past due June 15th. Any reports received after that date will cause the whole District to lose or delay funding next year.

NEW Grant applications for the 23-24 Rotary year are due July 1 or the first day of the new Rotary year. Club Presidents, you need to have new projects ready BEFORE your term begins. Do not miss these dates.

Secondly, all donations to the Rotary Foundation should be sent to Rotary International as soon as possible. All donations are so appreciated. Each increases the amount our District will receive back for use for District and Global Grants.

Particularly important are the donations from our Paul Harris Society members. It is one thing to make a commitment, another thing to comply with that commitment. So far, only 42% of Paul Harris Society members have paid their commitment. Please consider sending your contribution as soon as possible. The same is true of your personal commitment to help end polio.

UVU Rotaract Hosts Session on UN Commission on Status of Women

"Rotary International (RI) has been made of people who take action to create lasting change, both in

themselves, their community and globally," said Stephanie Velasco, the incoming General Secretary for Big West Rotaract, during the 67th session of the United Nations Commission on the Status of Women.

This March 6th event, sponsored by the non-governmental organization registered under the UN, Russian Academy of Natural Science, and an event sponsored by the Permanent Mission of Kyrgyzstan to the United Nations on March 8th, 2023, were co-hosted by 28 Rotaractors, led by its President Tristin Juarez-Smith and Alitha Thompson, including students from Utah Valley University, Kyrgyzstan, China, India, South Sudan, and Uganda.

They advocated for mountain women through the Student-Engaged Learning (SEL) model. SEL empowers all learners to work as a group to solve real-world problems with faculty as mentors. Rotaractors managed all logistics, research, and presented how the SEL model empowers mountain women and girls.

Velasco highlighted the impact Rotary International Friendship Exchanges, specifically Utah Rotary District and Northern Mexico Rotary District 4100 exchanges, have provided to their respective communities. Rotaractors

emphasized the contributions of women and girls worldwide, including in the State of Utah, one of the best models of sustainable mountain development. In addition, they reported on numerous community service projects in partnership with Orem-Lindon Rotarians. Rotaractors hope RI will sponsor future UN events.

The Vision of Rotary

The famed anthropologist, Margaret Mead, said, "Never doubt that a small group of thoughtful, committed individuals can change the world. In fact, it's the only thing that ever has."

When members of the **West Jordan Rotary Club** met at Nuerworx in Sandy, a nonprofit outpatient facility providing innovative therapy for adults and children affected by paralysis from spinal cord injuries, the world changed for a group of children.

These children with severe physical disabilities but exceptional cognitive functions were unable to play on their school playground in the Jordan School District due to accessibility issues.

Dr. Dale Hull, a South Jordan Rotarian and founder of Nuerworx, himself partially paralyzed from a spinal cord injury, invited the West Jordan Club to hear from a small band of parents and their beautiful, intelligent children who wanted nothing more than to experience the joy of playing during recess.

The cost of retrofitting the playground was \$10,000. The school district had prioritized the project low because of the number of children to benefit. Parents had worked for months but raised only \$2,000.

Thus entered the West Jordan Rotary Club, under the leadership of President Diana Brown. After a brief presentation by mothers and their children, Rotarian Stu Richardson stepped to the dais and said, "Let's get this money raised now!"

In a matter of minutes, a member shouted, "I'll contribute \$1000." Another offered \$500, then others weighed in. Many members, including the club's Assistant District Governor bid silently -"Put me down for this amount." Caught

up in the moment, a person who was investigating joining the club whispered, "I'm in for \$1000."

The amount went quickly from \$8,000 to a balance of only \$1,500. Then another West Jordan Rotarian, Pete Cardon, said, "I make a motion that the club covers the rest of the funds needed." The motion passed unanimously. The balance was \$0.

After the meeting, a club member sent an email: "Today was the first time I really saw the vision of Rotary. It was a beautiful thing."
