
Kris Swanson Recognized for Foundation Service

Abby Pruitt and her club have focused on service projects—"too many to list," said DG Jose Velasco in the award presentation.

This outstanding club of high school students creates fundraisers for service projects and activities throughout the year while they also develop talent and leadership skills among the members of Interact at Judge Memorial.

Rotary Club of the Year Awards

In his year as Governor, Jose Velasco decided to follow in the footsteps of Governor Linda Sappington who, during her Rotary year, awarded a Large – and a Small – Club of the Year based on their number of members.

DG Jose selected from among small-sized clubs (under 37 members), mid-sized clubs (between 38 and 75 members) and large clubs (over 76 members).

Large Club of the Year: **St. George Sunrise Rotary Club** was selected for the 2nd time in as many years for increasing their membership by 7; being very active locally and internationally in service projects as well as overall giving to The Foundation. SGS was also selected for consistent participation in district meetings and events, as well as actively interacting in Friendship Exchanges.





In the new category of Medium Club of the Year:

Murray Rotary Club was named for increasing membership by 12, for being very active locally and internationally in service projects as well as giving to The Rotary Foundation, and for consistent participation in district meetings and events.

Small Club of the Year: **Richfield Rotary Club** was recognized for being very active and involved locally and internationally in service projects as well as giving to The Rotary Foundation as well as for consistent participation in district meetings and events.

Rotaract Club of the Year: **Utah Valley University Rotaract** has greatly upped their level of performance as Rotaractors. With Tristin Smith as club president, they increased membership to 32 and focused their service efforts on several important local projects.

They also partnered with peers from Osh Technological University to jointly observe International Mountain Days, established in 2021 and participated at the 66th and 67th sessions of the United Nations Commission on the Status of Women.

KUTV-Channel 2 news anchor Brian Mullahy introduced his few moments on stage with a refreshing twist – objective, funny and informative - on the day's news. During a Q&A, Brian provided an open and honest perspective of today's life as a reporter impacted by the information/misinformation dictated by producers and news directors at every news organization.

"The humanitarian spirit in Utah communities is alive and well," said the award-winning news reporter. "We see it in every occasion whether it's a small disaster or large event; or whether it's a group of neighbors or groups like Rotary clubs."

He mentioned this humanitarian spirit is particularly reflected in recent events of flooding in Northern Utah, either through sand bagging,

providing food and/or shelter, or salvaging some of the families' belongings out of the waters in the homes.

Sharon Eubank Lauds the Partnership between Rotary & the LDS Church

Sharon Eubank, Executive Director of LDS Charities, spoke on the similarities and incredible humanitarian service provided around the world through a partnership between the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints and Rotary International.

"That is the reason the Church provided the gift of \$5 million in support of RI's program for the eradication of polio," she said. "This gift – one of several from LDS Charities - has now been matched 2x1 by the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation, to become a gift of \$15 million.



Sharon also addressed compliments and questions from the audience regarding some of the actions of the Church in different matters including humanitarian work around the world, local service and the complexity of dealing with many government, private and non-profit organizations.



The Magic of Rotary Delivers a Fire Truck to Mexico

Past District Governor Oscar Montano (District 4140 in Central Mexico), shared a story he called the "Magic of Rotary" describing in hilarious detail a problem-riddled trip to deliver an donated fire truck to the small city of Jalisco.

As Gov. Jose translated, Oscar Montano described the lengthy journey from California to Jalisco which was full of surprises and mechanical failures. Although some of the experiences along the way were very funny, some were also miraculous, which created an adventure worthy of Rotary.

Perhaps the most impressive miracle occurred after the truck was delivered to a grateful community. The first night a house fire broke out. Three lives were saved as the new equipment, in the hands of a capable crew, did what it was supposed to do thanks to the *Magic of Rotary*.

Paul Harris Pts Reward Heroine Who Saved Family from Arsonist



In the early part of 2022, arson by a single individual was a serious problem in the hills of Centerville/Farmington.

A family, newly relocated from Louisiana and California to Centerville, witnessed a fire which was too close for comfort. Randi Stevens, the wife and mother, was eager to prevent a repeat of this life-threatening situation so she distributed 14 fire extinguishers to her neighbors at her own expense just in case there was a "next time" due to drought and risk.

Not long after, she was preparing food for her local fire department as a way of thanking them for their service. While bringing groceries in from her car, a person nearly ran her over in an effort to start another fire. She took the lead, and with her family, put the fire out even before the fire department arrived and also restrained the individual until the police showed up.

For her initiative and bravery, the **Centerville-Farmington Rotary Club** made her a Paul Harris Fellow, honoring her and her family for their quick actions which saved many homes in the area.

This highlights the opportunity for Utah Rotary clubs to recognize some of the heroes in their communities while making Rotary relevant. Say thank you in this way to first responders, citizens, students or children going above and beyond the call of duty. Almost every club in our district has a bank of points to be used for this purpose.

She described the Committee's participation in the SLC Zone Institute, their work interviewing candidates to the Peace University Programs of Rotary. Kris and her committee have also given Positive Peace presentations to clubs in our district.

Our District's Peace Committee is also working in Northern Colombia to educate children in the positive change for peace dialogue and conflict resolution among future generations, funded by a Global Grant. The committee is currently selling


Colombian coffee as a fundraiser among Utahn Rotary clubs to add to Global Grant fundraising. Click here to purchase delicious coffee.

Rotaract Is Rotary's Future

Ignacio Gonzalez from Talca, Chile, is the Rotary world's leading Rotaractor as a member of RI President Jennifer Jones cabinet and her presidential representative. At D5420's District Conference, he shared the current vibe and trends Rotaract is experiencing in its evolution.

Rotaract is no longer a youth program and in the current year, members are now asked to pay RI dues because they are and should be working side-by-side with Rotarians. It is understandable such changes will still need time to accept on both sides of the aisle but as Rotarians we should

be prepared to offer Rotaractors a seat at the table and the opportunity to express themselves and actively participate to the fullest.

According to Ignacio Gonzalez, it is time to be part of the legacy and adapt to being part of the decision making as well as giving to the Rotary Foundation as suggested by Rotary International.

No longer do Rotaractors need a sponsor club or an advisor. What they need is Rotarian mentors and Rotarian partners who can help them understand the rewarding work and legacy of Rotary.

UVU Rotaract Hosted a UN Conference; the Ambassador for the Kyrgyz Republic

The 67th session of the UN Commission on the Status of Women was co-hosted by 28 **UVU Rotaractors**, led by President Tristin Juarez-Smith and Alitha Thompson and included students from Utah Valley University, Kyrgyzstan, China, India, South Sudan, and Uganda.



Rotaractors managed all logistics, research, and presented how the SEL model empowers mountain women and girls. Stephanie Velasco highlighted the impact RI Friendship Exchanges, specifically Utah Rotary District and Northern Mexico Rotary District 4100, have provided to their respective communities.

Additionally, they hosted the current Ambassador for the Kyrgyz Republic to the United States and Canada, H.E. Baktybek A. Amanbaev. and Patrick Hanish, the Director of the Office of Iranian Affairs in the Bureau of Near Eastern Affairs at the U.S. Department of State.

They have attended training meetings, District events and conference breakouts in numbers, more than any other Rotaract club in our district. They partnered with their club partner Orem-Lindon Rotary club and other Rotaract clubs throughout the year. Three Rotaractors spoke of their presentation at the United Nations in March where there were 22 Rotaractors participating in different panels hosted by the General Secretary of the UN in New York City.

Furthermore, Utah Valley University was recognized for their support of Rotaract for many years with a Paul Harris Fellow Award. The Rotaract Mentor is Rotarian Baktybek Abdrisaev, who is a teacher at UVU was awarded the Paul Harris Fellow for his support and work with Rotaract.

Our district is part of the Big West Rotaract, a Multi District Informational Organization (MDIO), a group of 30 member Rotary districts across three Rotary Zones (see Bigwestrotaract.org) Since 2009 BWR has focused on providing Leadership Training and Education to Rotaractors in the Western United States and Canada through leadership training Institutes, conferences, information exchange, and digital resources. Stephanie Velasco is currently one of the Directors but on July 1, 2023 she will become the General Secretary to serve through June 30, 2026, and she can be our best liaison to further Rotaract strength in our district.



Friendship Exchanges Cement North & South American Relationships

Stephanie Velasco gave an overview presentation about the district's three Friendship Exchanges to Mexico and Colombia.

Outbound: In February 2022, 37 Rotarians from District 5420 spent a week on a Friendship Exchange to Puerto Peñasco, Mexico District 4100. They completed six service projects in the community, in partnership with the local club, in four of RI's areas of focus including Water and Sanitation, Maternal and Child Health, Protecting the Environment, and Growing Local Economies with 7 Past District Governors among the group.

Inbound: After last year's International Convention a group of twelve Rotarians from Colombia (District 4271) including three Past District Governors came to Utah for a Friendship Exchange.

Later, a group of eleven from the Puerto Peñasco club in Mexico's District 4100 traveled to Utah where they also participated in service projects by invitation from different local clubs.

Both groups visited several areas and clubs from the south to the north in our district and we were able to establish relationships certain to continue for years to come.

Video Message from the Rotary International President

RI President Jennifer Jones's message for Rotarians during RY2022-23 has been "Imagine a world which deserves our best, where we get up each morning knowing we can make a difference. To better engage our members, we need to adapt and re-tool. Find out what they expect of Rotary and provide it to them. Do not wait until they leave Rotary to ask why they left. Engage them on the first meeting and provide them the opportunity to make a difference."

At our conference we heard President Jones thank all of us for our ability to serve and to see the world as an opportunity to make a difference. Utah Rotarians have done that and we have served proudly. Thank you all.






Zone Director Vicky Puliz Congratulates Governor Jose & Governor-Elect John Redd


