# Four Utah Clubs tour Columbia to fund deserving projects

In March Utah Rotarians from the Murray,
Bountiful, Latino-Hispanic and West Jordan
clubs visited three Columbian Rotary clubs to
donate and learn about their humanitarian projects.

The first stop was the **Rotario Club de Laurales** in Bogota, - their project: the prevention of

malnourishment. The **Laurales Rotary Club** has created 140 mill operations which produce milk and soybean paste used to make soybean pretzels, breads, brownies and cakes. The \$4000 from Murray and \$6500 from a District Grant/Bountiful/Latino-Hispanic added to the \$90,000 raised by the Laurales Foundation to start new community mills and expand their coverage to more Colombians needing nutritious food.

The Utah Rotarians visited the **Bogota Santa Barbara Rotary Club**. With donations from the **Utah Latino-Hispanic Club** - \$1000 – and the **Murray Rotary Club** -\$600 – they combined their own \$1,500 to support a 190-child school and senior center in rural Poco Lama, a poor, high-crime area.

The group also visited Communa 13/San Javier in Medellin to see how one of the most dangerous areas in the world has revitalized their city by connecting districts on steep hillsides with large outdoor escalators. Over 10 years, street criminals have become artists, musicians, rappers and hip-hoppers. Throughout Communa 13 you hear boom boxes and see athletic young adults rapping and hip-hop dancing. The graffiti and outdoor wall art is fantastic. The trip, both educational and philanthropic.



We were overstaffed that night! The **Bountiful Rotary Club** came out in force to help at the Bountiful Food Pantry! We had amazing attendance.

We enjoy being together and serving our community.



March was a busy month for the Ogden Rotary Club! The Club was able to continue the tradition of giving a physical dictionary to every 3rd grader in both Weber and Ogden School District once again. This tradition has been ongoing for decades by the Ogden Rotary Club and it's something the Rotarians look forward to every year. In addition to the annual Dictionary Project, we also got to hear from an author, Sam Daley-Harris on his book Reclaiming Our Democracy and Kenneth Applegate on his message of The Untapped Power of Gratitude.



On March 14 UVU Rotaractors Stephan Atkinson, Janessa- Michelle Purcell, Noah Farnsworth, and Braden Birbara together with Dastan Abikov, and Aidana Nurlanova, Rotaractors from Bishkek Nomad Club. and the Kyrgyz Republic, advocated for women and girls at the side event within the 68th session of the Commission on the Status of Women at the United Nations headquarters. This was achieved through a student-engaged learning model, which encourages students to work jointly on resolving real-world problems with their teacher mentoring them. In addition, Rotaractors together with Rotarians from Bishkek Club, the Kyrgyz Republic, and Orem-Lindon Club, discussed joint projects to implement six priority goals of Rotary International as well as to empower mountain women and girls in both states.



Hurricane Valley Rotary teamed with the Hurricane High School Interact Club to collect and donate \$1,000 worth of new socks to Switchpoint Community Resource Center. Rotarians Patty Nation and Mickie Bond delivered the socks to SwitchPoint, which coordinates a variety of resources available throughout the community to offer more comprehensive help to the homeless and those struggling with poverty. The high school Interact advisor, Jennifer Clark, said Interact members created banners and posters to advertise the drive, and they took flyers to teachers to display in their classrooms. "It was fun," she said, "to see the students collaborate, promote the idea to the school, and interact with teachers and other students as they worked toward a goal."





The Millcreek Rotary Club spent an evening in March packing boxes at the Utah Food Bank! Founded in 1904, Utah Food Bank has operated under various names but has remained true to a mission of Fighting Hunger Statewide.

317,000 Utahns, which equates to 1 in 11 individuals, are at risk of missing a meal today. Even more alarming is that 1 in 10 Utah kids are unsure where their next meal is coming from.

Last year, they distributed 60.2 million pounds of food, the equivalent of 50.1 million meals, to people facing hunger across the state.

Thanks for all your hard work Utah Food Bank and thanks for letting Millcreek Rotary Club be a part of it for one night! RRCI staff told Washington City Rotary Club members the nonprofit independent living center serves people of all ages with any type of disability – and their mission is to help these individuals live as independently as possible. RRCI's serves nine Southwestern Utah counties and provides services to more than 10,000 individuals each year through education, personalized services and assistive technology.

RRCI's vision is that individuals with disabilities and seniors in southwestern Utah achieve their maximum level of independence with full inclusion across all environments. They provide a number of programs for seniors, youth and the blind, among others. Staff and those served by RRCI believe people with disabilities have and exercise the same right as everyone else to live life to the fullest.



As per the **Orem-Lindon Rotary Club** tradition of serving local communities, Rotarian Cathy Ambrose spoke to 27 students and their parents at the Gunnison Valley High School's National Honor Society Induction Ceremony.

She was invited to speak by advisor Lars Johnson due to her work with UVU Rotaractors and Hope4Orem, inspiring the high school's BOMB (Bring Out My Best) squad to address suicide prevention.

Cathy spoke on the need for self-belief, to serve others, and to balance personal growth with mental health.

She also donated 10 copies of Mindset by Dr. Carol Dweck to Gunnison Valley High School.



The Park City Sunrise Rotary Club held their biannual Sunrise Poker Party in March. Players anted in a \$275 donation to the Sunrise Rotary Foundation which is, in turn donated to District Peace projects. The Paull Harris points were bestowed on first, second and third place winners along with some Rotary bling.
