Ever wonder how to start a new club in your community?

Governor Suzanne has asked me to serve as the district's new Club Development Chair for 2025-2026. Here's some basic information:

- You can start a new satellite club with only eight members. A satellite club's members belong to their sponsor club until if or when they charter as a new Rotary club.
- You can now charter a new Rotary club with only 15 members (a change this year from the previously required 20).

- Retaining existing members and recruiting new members to existing clubs is
 vitally important but starting a new club is the fastest way to grow Rotary
 membership in our district. Why, you might ask? It's simple Rotary research
 shows nearly 90% of members in new clubs are new to Rotary.
- We can even start new clubs in areas where there are existing clubs by offering a different meeting day or time and a different club experience.

If you are interested in starting a new club (and I hope you are), please contact me. I'm a resource to help you through the process. Let's start a number of new clubs this year!

World Polio Day is Friday, October 24

The woman in this picture is known as a "crawler." Her condition is the result of contracting the polio virus.

Flaccid leg syndrome, they call it, is a small part of the after-effects of polio known as Post Polio Syndrome.

You see, the polio virus rarely kills. It affects its victim at different levels of severity. A small minority don't even know they have polio until they are tested. But that is rare.

Post Polio syndrome includes muscle weakness - every muscle including the heart. Flaccid leg syndrome, as seen with this poor woman, happens to every 1:100 cases, contorting the legs and rendering them useless. This lady is vulnerable to more than just the disease.

As your District Polio Plus chair, it is my job to keep polio top of mind with all Rotarians in our district. And I must say, our district's contributions to Polio Plus are noble in per capita giving, including the \$5 million dollars donated by the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints a few years ago.

But I often hear, "Why are we still trying to get rid of polio? Isn't this a waste of money? Polio will never be here in the U.S."

Most of our members under 50 years old have never seen a polio victim. What you all should know - it is only an airplane ride away. There was a case two years ago in New York afflicting a person who had never traveled out of the United States.

Health care Global Grant in Rwanda

A significantly impactful Health Care Global Grant in Rwanda is nearing completion! Club sponsors, the Rotary Club of Park City and the Rotary Club of Kigali, are joined by partner clubs Park City Twilight and Salt Lake City, as well as our district and Rwanda's D9150, to raise \$58,000.

The funds will be used to educate and train high school girls and boys about menstrual hygiene issues and gender, sexual and reproductive issues.

In addition, training and equipment will be donated to make (and sell) reusable hygiene pads.

Five rural high schools in the Bwizi area are engaged and our local partner the University for Global Health Equity has overseen all aspects along with the Kigali Club.

The response so far from students, teachers, administrators and families has been overwhelmingly positive! Metrics including reduced dropout rates for girls and expanded knowledge base are showing dramatic improvements. Another great Rotary success!

Savvy Advice for Rotarians

Tax Smart Philanthropy

A **Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD)** is a tax-free withdrawal from an Individual Retirement Account (IRA) made directly to The Rotary Foundation. It serves as a popular way to do good while also satisfying the IRA holder's Required Minimum Distribution (RMD). A QCD is not



included in the IRA owner's Adjusted Gross Income (AGI) under IRS rules. Leveraging a QCD to lower one's Income could potentially reduce those taxes based on income, such as

Social Security benefits or Medicare Parts B and D premium surcharges. Available to owners and beneficiaries age 70½ or older, a QCD offers tax-free IRA distributions of up to \$108,000 in 2025.

Anyone 73 or older who has IRA or other tax-qualified pension or retirement funds must take Required Minimum Distributions (RMDs) annually. Your financial advisor can calculate this amount for you. By using QCDs for a contribution to The Rotary Foundation, more of your money does good in the world. *Important – the QCD check or wire must go directly to The Rotary Foundation from your fiduciary. Our District . . . a history of giving

On behalf of the District Foundation Committee in general, and of the Annual Fund Sub-Committee in particular, we would like to express thanks to all the clubs in our District and to all individual Rotarians who contribute each year to The Rotary Foundation in general and to the Annual Fund in particular.

Of the four preceding Rotary fiscal years ending June 30th, the most recent year ending June 30th, 2025, was a record giving year for the district and reversed what had been a downward trend of giving to the annual fund.

Total giving to the annual fund was \$360,089, which is \$221.18 per capita giving for 1,628 members of District 5420. We would like to recognize and give a shout out to seven clubs we consider superstars of annual fund giving...club per capita giving which exceeds \$300:

The 12 to 14-year-olds play soccer games throughout northern and central Utah. Several of the players come from low-income families here in Utah and some originate from difficult


and even tragic situations in countries like Columbia, Peru, Ecuador, India, Albania, and Venezuela.

In 2021 the two Rotary Clubs in Logan received a District Grant of \$2,000 to establish the Cache Valley Humanitarian Center. Accomplished in four years:

- 14,545+ people benefited with a \$1,202,445 dollar impact
- 30,591 Volunteer Hours
- 2,115 School Kits distributed—an ongoing project
- 2,928 Hygiene kits assembled
- 370 Sleeping Mats: Recycled grocery bags woven and distributed to organizations including BRAG, Cache Valley School Districts and the WAB Warming Center. (1000 bags & 30 volunteer hours/mat)
- 3,754 Coats: Collected and distributed new and gently used coats, hats, socks and gloves.
- 3,750 Quilts: Most volunteer made
- 604 Newborn Kits
- 5000+ Books for Kids: Collected, cleaned and redistributed through Centro de la Familia, Bear River Head Start and the Halchita Native American library.

welcomed community and families to this free event focused on expanding mental health resources and reducing stigma.


The Fair featured keynote speaker
