How to help Ukraine through Rotary

There are two ways



Ukrainian Rotary Clubs are distributing 350-400 generators to families in Ukraine. Each generator costs \$350 to purchase and transport along with associated supplies.

How many \$350 generators can you or your club fund?

Give \$350 cash per generator to help transport, amazingly rapidly, a shipment of 350 to 400 electrical generators and associated supplies for Ukrainian Rotary clubs across Ukraine to distribute free of charge to needy families.

Please mail your personal and club checks to me, Jerry Summerhays at the address below. Write your checks to "Utah Rotary Foundation," our new district 501(c)(3)."

The Rotary Action Group *Rotary in Sweden helps Ukraine* asked me to send our money every two weeks during their winter campaign. When they get enough from many clubs, mostly in the US and Canada, they send another shipment of generators, usually every 3-4 weeks.

Can you or your club help fund a Global Grant?

Commit a sum of money to a global grant that will be approved and matched by Rotary to provide urgently needed medical equipment and supplies for a central hospital or an outpatient clinic in Ukraine. The draft of the global grant is already written.

As soon as "*Rotary in Sweden helps Ukraine*" receives commitments for \$150,000 from clubs around the world, they will submit the global grant. Every 3 - 4 months another global grant is funded and approved. There is a single Rotary Grants Officer over Ukraine who works closely with the "Rotary in Sweden helps Ukraine" Action Group" and approves a global grant in minimum time.

I will then ask you for your personal or club checks.

I send **personal checks** in one envelope to Rotary so you get credit towards your major donor status. **Club money** will be wired to the global grant account in Sweden. The equipment going to Ukraine is already arranged.

Utah Rotaractors are highlighted by the UN

A joint initiative between Rotary District Rotaract, the Orem-Lindon Rotary Club, and Rotaractors from Utah Valley University (UVU) and Osh Technological University in the Kyrgyz Republic was recognized in the United Nations Secretary-General's report on sustainable development (A/80/255, July 24, 2025, p.11).

The UN report commended their advocacy for mountain women, families, and communities, highlighting the group's contributions during the 67th, 68th, and 69th sessions of the Commission on the Status of Women (CSW). This recognition places their work among the global best practices achieved between 2023 and 2025 by the 550 members of the United Nations Mountain Partnership.

The **Big West Rotaract**, representing 28 districts across three Rotary Zones in Western North America under **General Secretary Stephanie Velasco (2023–2026)**, a contributor with UVU Rotaractors. During the **67th CSW session in March 2023**, Rotaractors

participated in two key UN events: a **side event co-hosted by the Permanent Mission of the Kyrgyz Republic** on March 8 and a **parallel event hosted by UVU Rotaractors** on March 6.

In 2024 and 2025, the joint Rotaract teams visiting the United Nations included **20 and 19 students**, respectively. Their work has directly contributed to the forthcoming **United Nations General Assembly Resolution on Sustainable Mountain Development**, to be adopted in **December 2025**, which will outline global best practices and recommendations for advancing sustainable mountain communities.

Youth Exchange is one of the greatest Rotary programs. Each year we send multiple students from Utah across the world to broaden their cultural experiences and learn about other countries.


