

- Increases self-confidence


Why New Shoes

So here is the deal. The goal is to collect 25,000 pairs of shoes from the six Rotary Districts combined. Our district is committing to collect 2,000 pairs of shoes by April 1st. The shoes should be tennis shoes, any color. Sizes can range for elementary grade students.

We are focusing on drop off points in northern and southern Utah. More information will be available as negotiations progress.

How to help Ukraine through Rotary



Some Ukrainians are suffering much more than others.

Rotarians from the 50 Rotary clubs in Ukraine know their communities. They know the older people, the families whose father is away at war, or is dead, those whose homes have been damaged, those who could be helped most by an electric generator. **Rotarians come to the Rotary warehouse and take electric generators back to their communities to the people who need them the most . . . for light, for cooking, for heat.**

We thank The Rotary Action Group “Rotary in Sweden Helps Ukraine.” Since the invasion they have worked with the Ukrainian District and Rotary clubs to know what is needed most. **During the winter they are asking for as many electric generators (the inverter type) as we can provide for \$350 each.**

If you and/or your club want to help, please **write your checks to “Utah Rotary Foundation”** and mail them to Jerry Summerhays at 5022 West Rambutan Way, South Jordan UT 84009. Every few weeks we wire the money to “Rotary in Sweden Helps Ukraine”. It is amazing how fast the generators reach the families!

When the coldest weather is past, we will switch to funding a global grant to provide their next priority - hospital medical equipment to treat wounded soldiers. Would your club like to investigate being the international sponsor of this global grant? The grant is mostly written, awaiting funding.


