A powerful story



Utah Rotarians *go there* to help Ukraine

A lovely evening strolling through Lviv, an ancient town in western Ukraine, far from the war. Then every light goes out. The Russians have hit another power station. Somewhere in the dark a generator starts. A light turns on. As more generators start, the noise grows louder. This is the sound of war in Lviv.

Out of this darkness one light burns bright—Rotary clubs around the globe are organizing to deliver supplies to Ukraine. One such club is **Budapest-City (RCBC)** whose convoys have delivered supplies to Lviv for three years.

This February, Moab Rotarians Colin Fryer and Steve Getz joined the sixth convoy. Six vans and pickups filled with generators and medical supplies drove across Europe from London. Twelve volunteers from five clubs traveled four days to reach the Ukrainian border, then on to Lviv.

"Late that night, we arrived in our hotel just in time to experience a blackout," wrote Colin and Steve. "The next two days we delivered the supplies to different Rotary clubs. Generators went to schools, hospitals, and an orphanage located in Sumy, Kerson, Odessa, and Drabiv in the Cherkasy region. Medical supplies went to three hospitals.

"Within hours, we received messages from the facilities as they opened their presents—grateful nurses and doctors, kids and teachers who will be able to light and warm their school, all day long.

TEDxUttara was held on December 13, 2025, at the BGMEA University of Fashion & Technology in Dhaka, Bangladesh. Hosted under the prestigious global TEDx license, TEDxUttara brought together a dynamic mix of thought leaders, cultural icons, disruptors and dreamers from across Bangladesh and beyond.

One of them was Scott Leckman MD, surgeon and activist, who is a 65-year member of Rotary International and a long-time member of the Salt Lake City Rotary Club.

He spoke about his volunteer work with the advocacy group RESULTS, <https://results.org/> and about the first time he met Muhammed Yunas, the pioneer of microfinance, whose Grameen Bank has lent billions to people with low default rates.

Spoiler alert. One of the most amusing of Dr. Leckman's anecdotes is about buttonholing Robert Macnamara, President Kennedy's Secretary of Defense, at a urinal in the Brussels airport to bend his ear about Yunas' microcredit approach that he had just learned about in Bangladesh.

Youth Exchange goes to Capitol Hill & more!

in February we took our youth exchange students for another fun weekend experiencing different parts of Utah.

We began our weekend at the **state Capitol** where the students got a tour of the capital building, met with multiple legislators while the legislature was in session, and even got to go on the floor of the House of Representatives for a picture. We also attended a committee meeting to watch how bills are made.

Afterwards we drove up to **Park City** to attend a get together with the Park City Interact Club and other Park City Rotarians at the home of Christina Miller. While there we also watched the opening ceremonies of the Winter Olympics while each of the students cheered on their respective countries. One of our students is from Italy and grew up in Milan, so it was especially fun for him to see sights of his hometown.

The following day we toured the **Utah Olympic Park**, where the students got to see the bobsled, luge and skeleton tracks, as well as the Nordic ski jumps and ariel ski jump training areas. We then headed to Deer Valley where we hiked Empire Pass in the snow and went snowshoeing.

We finished our evening at **Soldier Hollow**, where we took the kids tubing. With the lack of snow this year it was interesting to see the tubing hill constructed out of man-made snow amidst the bare dirt surrounding the rest of the Olympic cross country skiing venue. Hopefully in 2034 we have more snow when we welcome the Olympics back to Utah.

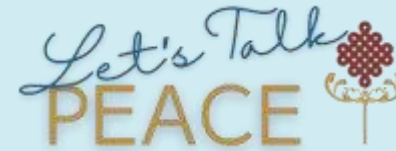
