CELEBRATING WOMEN'S HISTORY MONTH

The earliest Women's Day observance took place in 1909 in New York City. Two years later, over a million people across Europe protested for women's right to vote and against employment sex discrimination. These were the roots of both International Women's Day and Women's History Month. The observance was recognized first as a national week in 1980. In 1987, the commemoration expanded to the entire month of March, largely due to the National Women's History Alliance's (NWHA) efforts.

Today, women are an instrumental part of Utah Valley University (UVU). From the women in UVU's student body to President Astrid S. Tuminez and everywhere in between, women impact all levels of education at UVU. This March, we celebrate and honor the accomplishments of our women Wolverines.


Utah Conference on Undergraduate Research

(UCUR)

On February 17th the University of Utah hosted the Utah Conference on Undergraduate Research (UCUR). Students from all institutions across the state were present. UVU had 116 undergraduate researchers registered for the conference across 12 colleges and departments. Of the 116 students, 40% of those that presented research they have been working on were female students.

Body Acceptance Panel

Join the Women's Success Center in celebrating Women's History Month by attending "Beauty Counter: Arguments on Body Affirmation." In this hour-long event, students are invited to hear from a panel of women on what body image resilience and affirmation mean to them. Representatives from various campus departments will share their experiences in navigating media, advertisements, body size, and cultural expectations and stigmas surrounding women and their bodies.

Olivia Ellis, a student in the WSC Women's Leadership Academy, will facilitate the discussion. Olivia wrote a research paper on body image resilience primarily using More than a Body (2020) as her inspiration and guide. Olivia is passionate about women's issues, specifically how women can learn body resilience in a culture that objectifies and commodifies bodies. This conversation is pertinent to women across the globe and critical for women in Utah to hear, share, and discuss their not-so-unique experiences.

The outcomes of this event are to open the conversation and invest in initiatives that support body image resilience, amplify women's educational efforts, encourage women to focus on traits beyond physical appearance, and strengthen confidence through overall health and well-being.
